

The Divorce Rate, 2015 *

- ➤ The divorce rate (represented as the number of divorces per 1,000 married women aged 15 and older) continued to decline in 2015, reaching a 40-year low.
- The divorce rate was 16.9 divorces per 1,000 married women in 2015, down from a divorce rate of 17.6 in 2014.
- The divorce rate decreased by 25% from 1980 (22.6) to 2015.
- Just over one million women (1,110,579) divorced in 2015.
- ★ The divorce rate = [(number of women divorced in the past 12 months) / (number of women divorced in the past 12 months + number of currently married women)] * 1,000

🖈 Five Highest and Lowest Divorce Rates, 2015 💢

- ➤ Washington, D.C., continued to have the highest divorce rate, with nearly 30 marriages per 1,000 ending in divorce.
 - Washington, D.C. has had the highest divorce rate for the past two years (FP-15-18; FP-14-17).
- ▶ Hawaii continued to have one of the lowest divorce rates, with only 11 marriages per 1,000 ending in divorce.
 - Hawaii was the only state with a divorce rate under 12 in 2015.

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
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

Figure 2. State Variation in the Adjusted Divorce Rate per 1,000 Married Women Aged 15+ by Quartile, 2015



- ➤ Only Washington, D.C. had one of the five highest divorce rates in both 2014 and 2015.
- New Jersey and Hawaii both had one of the five lowest divorce rates in 2014 and 2015.
- Nineteen states had a higher divorce rate in 2015 than 2014.
 - Wyoming, which was ranked 41st in 2014, experienced the greatest increase (+88.1%), having the second highest divorce rate in 2015.
- Two states had stable divorce rates, barely changing from 2014 to 2015: Kentucky (21.1) and Minnesota (14.7).
- ▶ Thirty states had a lower divorce rate in 2015 than 2014.
 - Among these states, Rhode Island (-34.0), Delaware (-30.3), and Maine (-29.7) had the greatest percentage decreases.
