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




Figure 2: Percentages of Women's Interracial Marriage by Race/Ethnicity, 1970 - 2000

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



Figure 3: Percentages of Men's Interracial Marriage by Race/Ethnicity, 1970 - 2000

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



Figure 5: Trends in the Percentages of Interracial/ Interethnic Marriages Among Newly Married and Currently Married, 1980-2008

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


Figure 7: Race/Ethnicity of Spouses in Interracial/Interethnic Marriages Among White, Black, Asian, and Hispanic Men, 2008




Figure 9: Trends in the Percentages of Interethnic Marriages Among Hispanics, 1970-2000




