Call for Proposals – Small Grants for Research Using PSID Data

The Panel Study of Income Dynamics (PSID), with support from the National Institute on Aging, announces a small grant competition. The competition will fund 4-8 scholars in the range of \$10,000-\$20,000 each to use PSID to conduct research using new data on intergenerational transfers, extended family connections, and time use. Funded projects will generate papers that will be presented, along with other invited posters and presentations, at a two-day conference to be held June 9-10, 2016. Fragile Families Summer Data Workshop 2015

The Fragile Families Summer Data Workshop 2015 will be held June 17-19, 2015, at Columbia University in New York City. The [Fragile Families and Child Wellbeing Study](#) is a national study that follows a birth cohort of (mostly) unmarried parents and their children, providing information about the capabilities, circumstances, and relationships of unwed parents, the wellbeing of their children, and the role of public policy in family formation and parent and child wellbeing. The 2015 workshop will include special sections on the newly available genetic data in the Fragile Families Study.
