Call for Papers Special Issue on Immigration and Crime – Submissions due June 30, 2017

Migration Letters invites contributions for a special issue on crime, law, and justice studies related to immigration. A renewed interest in immigration and crime has emerged with the election of Donald Trump as U.S. President and as European countries continue to deal with immigration, generally, and refugees, specifically. As a result, many nations are re-working their immigration policies often because of a supposed link between immigration and crime. This is despite the large body of research that has shown little support for the assumption that increases in immigration are associated with increases in crime. Thus, there is a renewed imperative for research that examines the association between immigration and sociolegal processes. In this special issue, they seek to bring together a set of articles that addresses how immigration affects, and is affected by, crime and the law. Contributions to this special issue should comply with the author guidelines and respect the word limits of the Journal.
