A lecture and reception in late April introduced Oliver Boyd-Barrett as the new director of the School of Communication Studies.

"Boyd-Barrett's coming to BGSU brings a scholar of exemplary international stature to lead one of the largest units in the College of Arts and Sciences," Joseph Frizado, the interim director, said.

Boyd-Barrett will leave southern California where he has been teaching at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona, to start here July 1.

"The main attraction for me is the national and international prestige and strength of Bowling Green State University and of the School

of Communication Studies," Boyd-Barrett said.

Boyd-Barrett arrived from the United Kingdom to begin work in Southern California in May 1998. His wife was born in Kansas and raised in France and the United Kingdom. They have four children.

Boyd-Barrett said that they are looking forward to exploring other regions of the country and learning more about Ohio.

"This is an exciting time to join the School of Communication Studies," he said. "The reintegration of telecommunications, alongside interpersonal communication and journalism, gives us greater leverage for anticipating and responding to changes across the communication industries and professions, including those of technology convergence and innovation."

"Use the facilities here. Meet as many people as you can," Cathy Stelzer, a reporter for WHIO-TV Dayton, said. Stelzer, who started as a production assistant, said she learned everything she knows during her years at the University.

Stephanie Mennecke, a weekend anchor and general assignment reporter for the Ohio News Network, also appreciated her time at BGSU. Mennecke worked at BG24 News, the student television journalism organization. Working at BG24 was "good, because you can learn everything and stations like people who know how to do everything," she said.

Rebecca Marker-Smith, director of Marketing & Membership at

the Logan County Chamber of Commerce, said she got her position through knowing someone on her bowling team. "Get involved to meet someone who will know someone," she said.

Kelli Kling, assistant to the Director of the Wood County Historical Center & Museum, said students should keep their options open. "Don't lose sight of all the other opportunities that are out there," she said. "It's great to go off to Chicago, Detroit... but there's also something to be said for being a big fish in a small pond."

Andrea Sterling worked a shift on one of the university's radio stations, WFAL, as a freshman. "It's truly an amazing program," she said.

Despite her time spent with WFAL, Sterling, assignment editor for WXIX-TV Cincinnati, wished she studied television more during her time at the university.

Barrett also represented Jim Lyle, who could not attend the panel but relayed his message to the students to find an internship early, set realistic but obtainable goals and have fun.

West Hall television studio control room gets upgrade

A crew of professors, technical support staff and students in the School of Communication Studies completed the latest phase in a long-term effort to remodel and modernize the West Hall television studio. Construction took place during a fevered three-day effort by the crew over spring break in early March.

Tom Mascaro, telecommunications; Jim Foust, journalism; Jim Barnes, technical support coordinator; Becky Gulden, general manager BG24 News, and Jay Schell, BG24 News technical director, removed a dilapidated temporary table where the television director and assistant director sit and a fabricated wooden table housing the video switcher and character generator.

Using funds from the BG24 News team and supplemental funding approved by the School's interim director Joe Frizado, the School purchased two professional studio consoles from the Argosy Corp. in St. Louis, Mo. The consoles contain standard rack-mount openings, which will accommodate variations on future equipment.

During the installation of the consoles, the crew also raised the floor for the director and the racks containing television monitors to improve the line-of-sight for the director. A new wood-grain Pergo floor was installed in place of the older linoleum finish, providing a long-lasting surface for the daily

costing \$25,000, threatened to take the daily newscast off the air and curtail class productions in journalism and telecommunications.

Anne-Marie Lancaster who responded by supporting the emergency purchase of a replacement switcher.

Professors Mascaro and Foust, however, raised the issue then of the need for an ongoing maintenance program to replace outdated equipment. Through a series of consultation meetings with their department heads, BGSU administration and key WBGU-TV personnel, Mascaro and Foust developed an inventory, life-cycle chart, and plan to systematically replace outmoded equipment

During a December semester break, Mascaro redesigned the configuration of the West Hall control room to improve the layout, which paved the way for the recent installation of the consoles.

At that time, insufficient funds prevented installation of a new console, so a temporary table was clamped to the floor. A few years later, Schell volunteered to work as an apprentice engineer under the guidance of Barnes.

Schell, Barnes and other students replaced wiring between the television monitor racks and the other engineering equipment. This was a key step facilitating the final construction of the flooring and installation of the consoles.

The control room is used for all television studio classes, including TCOM 263, and some journalism classes. Additionally, BG24 News broadcasts at 5:30 p.m. on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays during the semester. Visitors are welcome during the BG24 newscasts.

The faculty-staff-student crew hopes the next phase of development will see an upgrade to HDTV, high-definition television cameras.

Clark was hired shortly after graduation and has remained at WTOL for seven years. She was the first African-American woman to direct television news at the station. She hopes to found her own production company.

Stoessner worked in one of the rare paid internships in the media business at Cincecraft in Cleveland. near his home.

After graduation he applied for a job and was hired full time, where he worked for two years as a media producer for corporate clients.

Stoessner honed his skills on various media production software platforms, such as AVID Media Composer, After Effects, Photoshop, and DVD authoring tools. He honed his demo DVD and distributed it widely. In late March, he accepted a position as a New Media Producer at Brainstorm Media in Columbus, near his fiancé. The two met at a Dance Marathon.

Clark and Stoessner talked about how they made an effort as interns to be active learners at their host companies, often trying to learn new positions and how to operate unfamiliar equipment.

Both, however, also stressed the value of campus involvement. Clark was a member of the Black Student Union, Gospel Choir and an employee at WBGU-TV, Channel 27.

Stoessner was active in fraternity life, Dance Marathon and the campus TV news program, BG24 News.

Stoessner told Tom Mascaro that his classes in Visual Communication Technology helped him learn how to operate software, but his TCOM classes taught him to "pull everything together to tell a story."

DR. THOMAS MASCARO

Mascaro promoted

Thomas Mascaro has been promoted to associate professor by the College of Arts and Sciences and granted Tenure by the Ohio Board of Regents. Mascaro was hired by Douglas Ferguson, former chair, in fall 1998 as a full-time instructor of the television production and writing classes. He was invited by Jim Foust, journalism, to assist with the faculty advising to BG24 News, the student television news team.

Mascaro is an officer of the History Division and editor of the newsletter for the Broadcast Education Association.

In late 2004 he and a colleague at the University of Wisconsin, Stevens Point, Bill Deering, successfully proposed a new research division to BEA focused on the study of the documentary, which is Mascaro's research specialty.

Mascaro was invited by the editor of the Journal of Popular Film & Television to be a guest

editor of a special theme issue of that international research and criticism journal. The theme of the issue is "African Americans in Film & Television: Twentieth Century Lessons for a New Millennium." The issue is in final stages of editor selection and due out in 2006.

Last January, Mascaro was selected as a Faculty Fellow for the National Association of Television Program Executives.

In December, *Journalism History* accepted a historical research analysis by Mascaro on the CBS News document known as the Benjamin Report. The Benjamin Report was the result of a 1982 internal investigation by CBS News into charges that a documentary, *CBS Reports* "The Uncounted Enemy: A Vietnam Deception," was flawed. The article is due out in July.

Next year, Tom Mascaro plans to continue advising and improving BG24 News and hopes to start a new student organization devoted to the study and production of documentaries.

DR. SRINIVAS MELKOTE

Melkote recognized by graduate students

Srinivas Melkote has been here for the 21 years. His research interests include the role of communication media in social change, international communication and communication for HIV and AIDS.

In 2004, Melkote received a certificate of appreciation for outstanding service and dedication to students awarded by the Graduate Student Enhancement Programs.

He wrote a chapter titled "Communication for Social Change: A Journey with Everett M. Rogers" that is still at the press. He published a chapter titled "Development and Communication in Africa" in 2004.

Melkote was a panelist on "Communication and other social factors associated with condom use among commercial workers in Chennai, India," which took place in New York in May.

Melkote has also had a paper accepted for discussion about the Role of Public Service Broadcasting in the Age of Globalization in 2004. He also had two other papers presented in 2004 to the International Communication Division of the

International Association for Media and Communication Research. One discussed the "Role of attitudes and innovation attributes on the utilization of and satisfaction with the Internet and e-mail: Policy implications for Vista University, South Africa," and the other discussed "Providing Care to Persons with Leprosy: Implications for Participatory Communication."

DR. PETER SHIELDS

Shields editor of special edition on surveillance

Peter Shields was the guest editor for a special issue of *Telecommunications Policy* on "Network Surveillance and Security" which will be published this summer. He was also promoted to full professor by the College of Arts and Sciences.

Shields' recent research has been focused on financial globalization, money laundering, surveillance and telecommunications networks.

Policy makers and law enforcement agencies have argued that advances in telecommunications networks have exacerbated the problem of money laundering. Shields' research examines different aspects of this argument and he suggests an alternative to the proliferation of this surveillance-intensive regulation.

In 2004, Shields published an article in *Peace Review: Journal of Social Justice*. He will also have two other articles appear in the next few months, one in *Journal of International Communication*, and the other in *New Media and Society*.

DR. EWART SKINNER

Chair responsibilities include reintegration

July 2005 marks the start of Ewart Skinner's fifth year as chair of the department. In the past year, he has dealt with the planning and execution of the department's reintegration into the School of Communication Studies.

His most recent research interest is in HIV/AIDS and communication in the Caribbean, where he has worked on a contract with the Caribbean Epidemiological Centre (CAREC) on an HIV/AIDS project in St. Vincent, West Indies. The study was a review and reworking of KAP (Knowledge Attitudes and Practice) surveys done earlier.

His recent publications include

"Building Multidisciplinary Teams: Merging Qualitative and Quantitative Research" in HIV/AIDS projects, published in the West Indian Medical Journal and "Vulnerability of Female Commercial Sex Workers in HIV Infection: Examination of Factors Related to Use of Condoms" (Velu, S; Melkote, S & Skinner, E) in the Kentucky Journal of Communication. He has also presented on "Research Problematics in Caribbean Social Science" at the Caribbean Studies Association meeting in Belize, Central America in 2003.

In 2004 he presented three papers on HIV/AIDS in the Caribbean at the International Association of Mass Communication Research conference in Porto Alegre, Brazil, and at the 2nd HARP Second Scientific Conference on HIV/AIDS Research at the University of the West Indies in Kingston, Jamaica. He also has two articles on HIV/AIDS under review.

Skinner is a dissertation and masters thesis reviewer and external reader for the University of the West Indies Jamaica and Trinidad campuses.

At BGSU, he served on the provost's diversity leadership team, which includes diversity committee work on faculty and staff hiring and retention and merit.

DR. GI WOONG YUN

New media focus of group, courses

Gi Woong Yun is part of a department emerging media group which meets bi-weekly to discuss emerging media technology. He is also teaching two new 400-level courses dealing with new media and online communities.

In addition to his teaching, Yun had four articles published in refereed journals during the last year. All the articles dealt with his research on brand familiarity and digital manipulation of fashion models.

He presented three papers at the International Communication Association conference held in New York and one paper at the Association for Education in Journalism and Mass Communication's convention in Toronto, Ontario. He was also a reviewer at the AEJMC conference.

An invited article, titled "Network and Cable Broadcasting Regulation in Korea," will be published by the Korean Broadcasters Association.

BROADCAST GRADUATE LETS LIFE'S ADVENTURES LEAD HER STOTY telling

May graduate Nicole Spino certainly has stories to tell after her years at Bowling Green.

While working toward her degree in broadcast journalism, Spino's studies took her from West Africa to the Great Wall of China. In the fall of 2003, she spent the semester at sea and traveled to 10 countries.

One of her most significant trips, however, was a family vacation to California where she toured a studio and realized that making films was her calling. "We went to a studio and that was when I thought, 'this is what I want to do,'" she said.

In her final semester here, Spino produced a documentary, "Wings of Compassion," about her grandmother, Anna Lou Spino, who worked as a stewardess for Flying Tiger Airlines in the 1950s.

Anna Lou had never been on an airplane when she first decided to attend flight attendant school in New York. "She basically got up, left home, and took this train to New York City because she saw an ad in the back of a magazine," Spino said.

A year later Anna Lou began her work with the famous airline.

Flying Tiger Airlines was started by World War II pilots who were out of work when they returned to the United States. Beginning as a cargo airline, it eventually began taking passengers, which is when Anna Lou joined the company.

Anna Lou took part in historical events such as the Korean babylift where war orphans were flown from Korea to the United States to be adopted. She was also part of the Hungarian lift where Hungarian refugees were transported to Australia and the United States.

Spino's story was shown at the spring Video 3 festival. Professor Tom Mascaro said, "Niki's documentary, which made excellent

use of nonlinear editing and digital photography techniques, was well received by the audience."

Spino, much like her grandmother in her spontaneous efforts, takes what she can from life. She was accepted to the American Pavilion Student Filmmaker Program, held at the 2005 Cannes Film Festival. The program is highly competitive and requires a substantial application and screening process.

"I actually was just looking for an internship online and I just came upon it and thought 'this looks really cool' so I sent in my application," Spino said.

Spino, also a dance minor, travels to Cannes in May for the three-week training experience.

While in France, Spino will get to meet with directors and actors from all over, as well as the opportunity to attend a red carpet screening.

When she returns she would like to move to Los Angeles and begin writing a screenplay while taking a year off. She is considering going to film school and hopes to take acting classes because she feels a good director must be familiar with acting.

While historical documentaries are something Spino looks forward to making, feature films are also a possibility. "I would like to make feature films, maybe, but I want to make historical films that mean something," Spino said.

Spino plans to continue working on the documentary, and Flying Tiger Airlines may be a feature film that Spino works on in the future.

"I think I would eventually like to write a screenplay about [this], fictionalize it somewhat because there are so many different locations where you could shoot, and it would be a really interesting story," Spino said.


