## **Research Opportunities**

Our professors are known for their research on issues such as adolescent romantic relationships and the transition to adulthood, inequalities in the justice system, family structure and child well-being, and violence in intimate relationships (to name just a few). Students may have the opportunity to assist faculty with their research. In addition, our sociology department has two federally funded research centers —The Center for Family and Demographic Research (CFDR) and the National Center for Family and Marriage Research (NCFMR) — in which students may have the opportunity to work as interns. We support students in presenting their own research at the BGSU undergraduate research symposium.

## **Real-World Opportunities**

Students are encouraged to pursue related internships in their selected areas of interest. BGSU sociology students have completed internships at the Victims Advocacy Program, Wood County Board of Developmental Disabilities, Toledo Municipal Court, City of Toledo Department of Police Operations, Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction, Unison, Epilepsy Center, NFO Research, Inc., Cleveland Clinic Foundation, and other facilities and businesses.
