**Dr. Rob Huebert** is Associate Professor in the Department of Political Science at the University of Calgary. He is also the Associate Director of the Centre for Military and Strategic Studies. His research interests include international relations, strategic studies, the Law of the Sea, maritime affairs, Canadian foreign and defense policy, and circumpolar relations. He publishes on Canadian Arctic security, maritime security, and Canadian defense. Huebert is sought for comments on Canadian security and Arctic issues in both the Canadian and international media.

**Ms. Rosemary Cooper** is Political Coordinator for Inuit Tapiriit Kanatami (ITK), Canada's national Inuit advocacy organization. Ms. Cooper was selected in 1997 by the Interim Commissioner of Nunavut to assist in the establishment of the Government of Nunavut. She then held the post of Assistant Deputy Minister of Health and Social Services. She transferred to Executive and Intergovernmental Affairs as the Assistant Deputy Minister of Policy, Planning, Communications, and Evaluations in 2004. She took her current position in 2007 and is responsible for the planning of the Education Summit in 2008.

**Dr. Terry Fenge** is Principal of Terry Fenge Consulting Inc., specializing in international public policy in the circumpolar Arctic. Formerly, Fenge was Executive Director of the Canadian Arctic Resources Committee and Senior Negotiator for the Tunngavik Federation of Nunavut known for the 1993 Nunavut Land Claims Agreement. Currently, he is Senior Policy Advisor to the Arctic Athabaskan Council. Blending research and advocacy in order to translate science into public policy, he has published on persistent contaminants, climate change, and biodiversity conservation.
