ADMISSION PROCEDURES

- Declare your intent to be a Recreation Major with an option area (Public/Voluntary Public Assembly/Association Management Emphasis or Program Development/Special Events and Meeting Planning Emphasis; Therapeutic Recreation Minor; or Environmental Education Minor) at the Office of Student and Academic Services for the College of Education and Human Development (365 Education Building, phone: 419.372.7372)). This office can assist in planning for your initial courses in Recreation, issues with your Degree Audit reports, and graduation applications. Declare any minors here also.
- After declaring your *intent to major* at the Office of Student and Academic Services for the College of Education and Human Development, a faculty advisor will be assigned and you must meet the following admission requirements for entry into the Recreation Major.

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

- Require a 2.5 accumulative GPA.
- Complete RTD 1900 and RTD 2100 with a 2.75 average
- Complete 30-32 hours of BG Perspective courses
- Maintain a 2.5 GPA to be eligible for field experience work (RTD 3870, 4870, and 4880)
- Complete the following courses in sequence—RTD 1900 2100, 3850—prior to being eligible for field experience

MATRICULATION FORM

- Apply to the program by completion of a Matriculation form near the end of the appropriate semester in which you will complete your admission requirements. See the matriculation forms for the deadlines. Forms are available at 119 Eppler North.
- Once informed of acceptance by letter, students may continue the sequence of professional core courses.
- If transferring into the program, must allow for at least 3 or 4 semesters for course work and internship.

RETENTION

- As a recreation major, each student must maintain an overall 2.5 GPA.
- Adhere to all the prerequisites for RTD courses.

FIELDWORK – PRACTICUM AND INTERNSHIP

- Download Fieldwork Manual for forms – Go to Web page – <http://www.bgsu.edu/departments/hmsls/>, then click on *Sport Mgmt, Rec & Tourism*, click on *Recreation and Tourism program*, click *courses* then scroll to the bottom *Fieldwork manual*
- Look for your site at least one semester before your fieldwork semester. See the office for application deadlines.
- Practicum (RTD 3870) (introductory level educational experience in a work setting).
- Prerequisites: Recreation major, RTD 1900 or RTD 2100, RTD 3850, 2.5 GPA, and approval of advisor.
- Internship (RTD 4880 – 15 credits – 600 work hours).
- Prerequisites for internship (RTD 4880): Recreation Major, 2.5 GPA, RTD 3840, RTD 3850, RTD 3860, RTD 3870, and approval by advisor of the application form. (Application form is used to register you through the RTD office.)
- Site pre-approved by faculty advisor by submitting application forms and list of responsibilities.

GRADUATION

Student must achieve a 2.5 accumulative GPA, meet degree requirements and apply for graduation on-line prior to the term deadline or afterward in Room 365 Education Building.
