We are just about a couple weeks away from Class Con 2024, *Approaching Academia: A Conference on Class Consciousness and Culture*, which will be held on March 15th and 16th, in the Pallister Room of Jerome Library!

Our Keynote Speaker, Gary Roth, will give a talk on "The Educated Underclass," BGSU Associate Dean Phil Dickinson will speak about the "Midwestern Eerie," confluence of art, writing and aesthetics in the modern and contemporary Midwest, and the Bowling Green Socialists, will be giving a public class at the end of day one.

We are also very excited to have two organizers, Zara Anwarzai and Anne Kavalerchik, from Indiania University to discuss graduate student bargaining.

We will also have a workshop on time capsules and will create one in honor of the 50th anniversary of the very first popular culture program, which began right here at BGSU! And, back by popular demand, is our zine making station (see last year's zine here). We hope participants and attendees will create their own zine pages to be included in our time capsule.
