



# Sanctification: A Meta-Analytic Review

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## Abstract

The authors reviewed 37 studies ( $n$  cases = 361) published in peer-reviewed journals from 1999 to September 2014 that evaluated relationships between sanctification and various correlates. Meta-analytic techniques were used to convert sanctification-correlate associations into standardized effect size  $zr$ 's. Using a random effects model, a significant relationship emerged between sanctification and all correlates,  $zr = .26$  (95% C.I. = .23-.28). This indicates that sanctification has a moderate relationship with positive psychological variables.

## Introduction

- Sanctification: "perceiving an aspect of life as having divine significance and character" (Mahoney, Pargament, & Hernandez, 2013)
- Sanctification can occur in various domains:

Relational	Non-Relational
Marriage/Romantic Relationships	Strivings
Parenting	Body
Pregnancy	Work
Sexuality	Environment
	Forgiveness
	Dreams

- Sanctification has theistic and non-theistic components, measured respectively:
  - Theistic: viewing a domain as a *manifestation of God or the divine* (MG scale)
  - Non-theistic: viewing a domain as having *sacred qualities* (SQ scale)

### Goals of Meta-Analysis

- Summarize the literature on sanctification.
- Assess the magnitude of the relationship between sanctification and outcome variables (e.g., relationship satisfaction, investment, and commitment).

We predict that sanctification permeates into both relational and non-relational aspects of everyday living, correlating with positive outcomes.

## Methods

- Title & abstract search for "sanctification" and "sanctified" in PsycINFO and Psychology & Behavioral Sciences Collection yielded 144 studies
- After reviewing abstracts for relevance, 36 articles were identified for full review
- Conducted Web of Science reverse citation search and found an additional 11 studies for full review
- Overall, 37 studies met inclusion criteria: quantitative methods, peer-reviewed, construct validity

### Coding Policies & Data Analyses

- 100% double-coding of bivariate correlations
- Assigned conservative value of  $p = .5$  (i.e.,  $zr = 0$ ) for unreported or non-significant findings
- Converted  $r$  to  $zr$  (weighted by sample size)
- Aggregated  $zr$ 's for overall effect size of sanctification and domains

## Results

- 37 studies yielded 361 sanctification-outcome correlations
- 22 community, 10 college, 5 national samples
- 83% Caucasian, 85% Christian, 58% female
- Sanctification measures:  $\alpha = .92$

### Publication Bias Assessment

- Kendall's tau =  $-.146$  ( $p < .001$ )
- Rosenthal's Method = 564,633

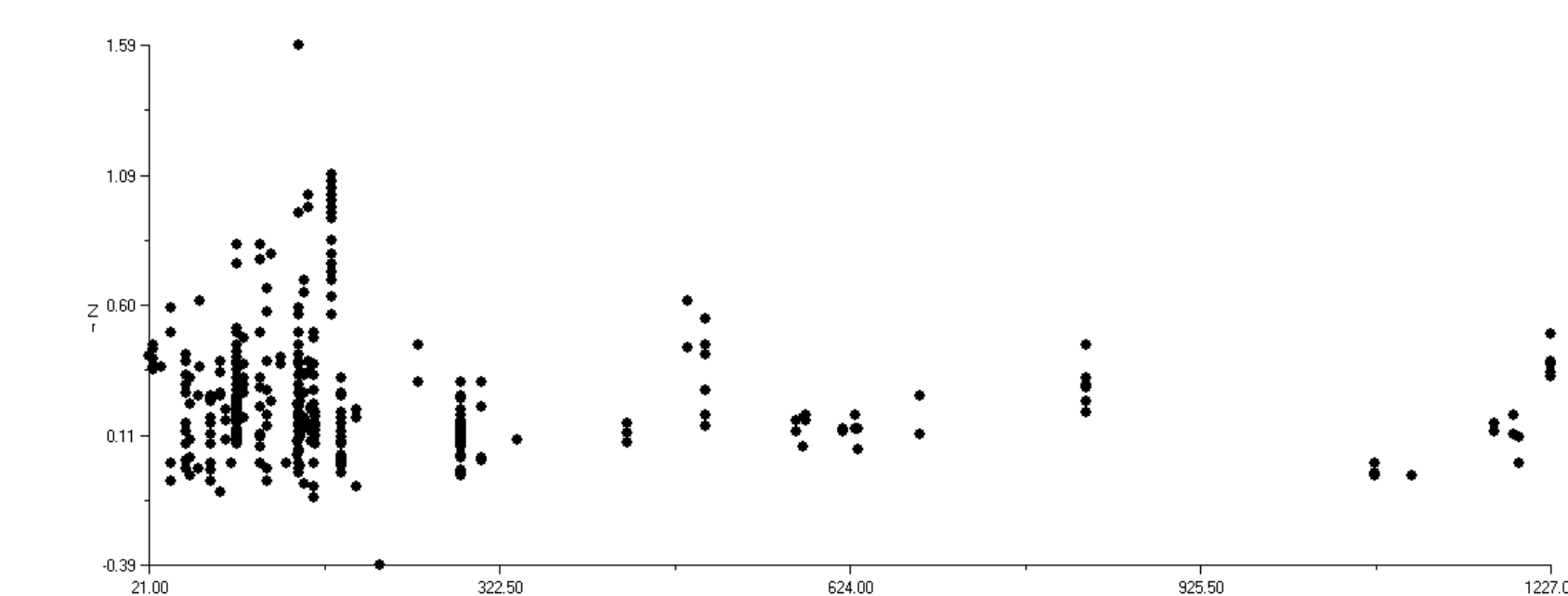


Figure 1. Funnel plot of  $zr$ 's by  $N$ .

## Recommendations & Conclusion

- Longitudinal studies recommended, especially with more diverse populations
- Expansion of research to other sanctified domains

Overall, there is a moderate relationship ( $zr = .26$ ) between sanctification and positive psychological variables, including relationship satisfaction, investment, and commitment.
