- B egin setting the stage for the year at orientation or open house.
- T his time must be managed by the teacher so that one or two parents do not monopolize the time.
- H ave a presentation to share so that you are included that the share of the time.

 - I ndex card or sheet to write questions that I can answer via email or on my website.





S.M.A.R.T.GOALS

- S= specific: I n detail, define exactly what it is you want to accomplish.
- M = measurable: D ecide how you will measure your progress and most importantly, how will you know if you have achieved your goal.
- A = accountability: M ake a full commitment to be personally responsible for achieving your goal.
- R = R ealistic, R devant, and R esult O riented: set goals that are ambitious, but achievable. Check to make sure your overall sense of purpose and value.
- T = T imeLine: Create a dear time line foe achieving your goal

More S.M.A.R.T. Goals

- S= specific your goal is a detailed plan, not a general idea
- M = measurable your goal needs to move you forward with each step
- A = action oriented your goal calls you to action, to do it now
- R = realistic-you can reach your goal and it makes sense with what you want in life
- T = timely-you have dates of completion for each step you're taking





- Students can:
 - D raw, use magazines, or stickers
 - Write them with a parent (see sample)
 - W rite them with an older student, a buddy, who models and scribes for them







- B est to have a lesson or two about goal setting.
- M odd goal setting process and sample goals.
- U se template or form.

Follow-up at mid-term or interim.





By this age one would hope they are familiar with goal setting so allow them to be creative. Let them write a rap song, a poem, make a podcast or video. These have a lot more personal significance and are a HOOT!!! to view later. View and compare to actual grades at interim and grade card time.




- Students should participate, at least be present.

- Goals and R eflections








- I have the students select some and I select some.

• This must be modeled and practice at first, after students have been "trained" reminders and time to prepare in dass are all that are needed.





- I ntroducing parents to teacher
- Explaining and showing:
 - Notebook
 - D ata folder
 - Goals





- K exp the conversation geared towards "W hat can we do for J ohnny?"
- I f a parent is upset
 - Hear them out, within reason
 - A sk them to come back later
 - I nvite the P ringipal, counglor, another teacher to sit in
