Faculty Spotlight

David Bixler is the Associate Professor of Jazz Saxophone and Director of Jazz Activities at BGSU. He directs Jazz Lab Band I, teaches applied lessons, courses in jazz studies, and works with chamber jazz groups. Mr. Bixler has performed and toured with the orchestras of Lionel Hampton, Toshiko Akiyoshi, and Duke Ellington, and has collaborated with Grammy-winning pianist Arturo O'Farrill.

Bixler is also an accomplished composer, educator and clinician. Each year, he arranges for accomplished jazz artists to visit BGSU for residencies where they present master classes and perform with students in the jazz studies program. Recent guests include Maria Schneider, Matt Wilson and Miguel Zenón. He also hosts his own podcast, "Liner Notes," that provides artists with a platform to speak about their process creating an album, and reveals the humanity behind their music.
