The baccalaureate program in social work is designed to prepare graduates to be generalist social work practitioners. As compared to social work training in the past, when the student chose a methodology as a major area (namely casework, group work, community organization or administration), the student today is trained for a different perspective, namely a systems approach. The social work generalist is a person who has knowledge and skills to work in social systems, large and small.

Points of Pride

- Students gain valuable experience while participating in required community service programs, helping them apply classroom knowledge to real-life situations.
- Accredited by the Council on Social Work Education
- Graduates of accredited programs are eligible for licensure in states that have social work licensure laws, including Ohio.
- The student to faculty ratio is 25 to 1 allowing for increased student-faculty contact and enhances classroom interaction.
- Student Organization of Social Workers (SOSW) is an organization consisting mostly of pre-social work and social work majors.
- Career opportunities include mental health, child welfare, schools, hospitals, criminal justice agencies, home health, geriatrics, chemical dependency, and child and family services.

She completed numerous internships in the Toledo area working with the elderly, acting as an assessor and case manager. Lee graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Social Work but did not stop there. "With the support and encouragement of the social work department, I applied and attended the University of Michigan School of Social Work." During the 16-month program she completed internships at Towsley Village, an assisted living facility for people with dementia, and the second at Jewish Family Services of Metro Detroit. Lee graduated in December 2014 and has been working at the Central Ohio Area Agency on Aging as an assessor for the MyCare Ohio Waiver program.
