

NEET or NEETH? How should we classify homemakers in the U.S.?

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Introduction

- Original UK definition of NEETs: Youth aged 15-24 not currently enrolled in school, not currently working, and not currently in a training program.
- In the U.S., NEETs are typically defined as youth aged 16-24 (for exception, see work by DeSliver at Pew) and are recognized in pejorative terms (e.g. "Disconnected Youth," "Disengaged Youth," "Idle Youth").
- I argue for a new definition: Youth aged 16-29 not in education, employment, training, OR homemaking; AKA NEETH.

Research Questions

- How should we define NEETs in the U.S.?
 - What age range?
 - Should homemakers be coded as NEETs?
- What is their prevalence?
- What is the probability of being a NEET or a NEETH by gender controlling for covariates?

Data & Sample

- Data: IPUMS-CPS, October Education Supplement, University of Minnesota, www.ipums.org.
- Due to sample sizes, we exclude those of Asian descent, and racial/ethnic "other"; those we were unable to ascertain metro status or nativity status.
- Control for gender, race/ethnicity, nativity, educational attainment, metro status, Census division, relationship status, presence of parent in household, and presence of an own child in household.

Analytic Strategy

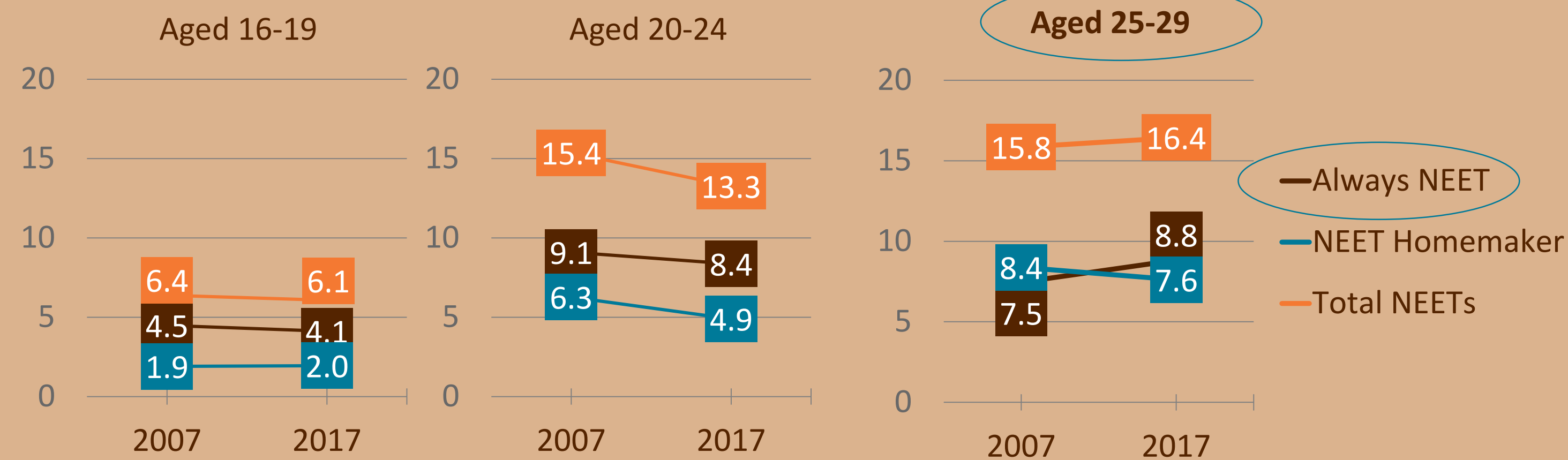
- Descriptive statistics: Examine trends by age and NEET type.
- Multivariate: Predict NEET & NEETH and examine gender differences between the two models when controlling for covariates including relationship status, presence of a child, and homemaker status.

Main Findings

- Specifying homemakers as NEETs and limiting the age range to 24 masks the group struggling ten years post-recession.
- Specifying homemakers as non-NEETs changes the relationship of gender to the risk of being a NEET.
 - If homemakers are coded as NEET, women are significantly more likely to be a NEET.
 - If homemakers are NOT coded as NEET, women are significantly less likely to be a NEET.

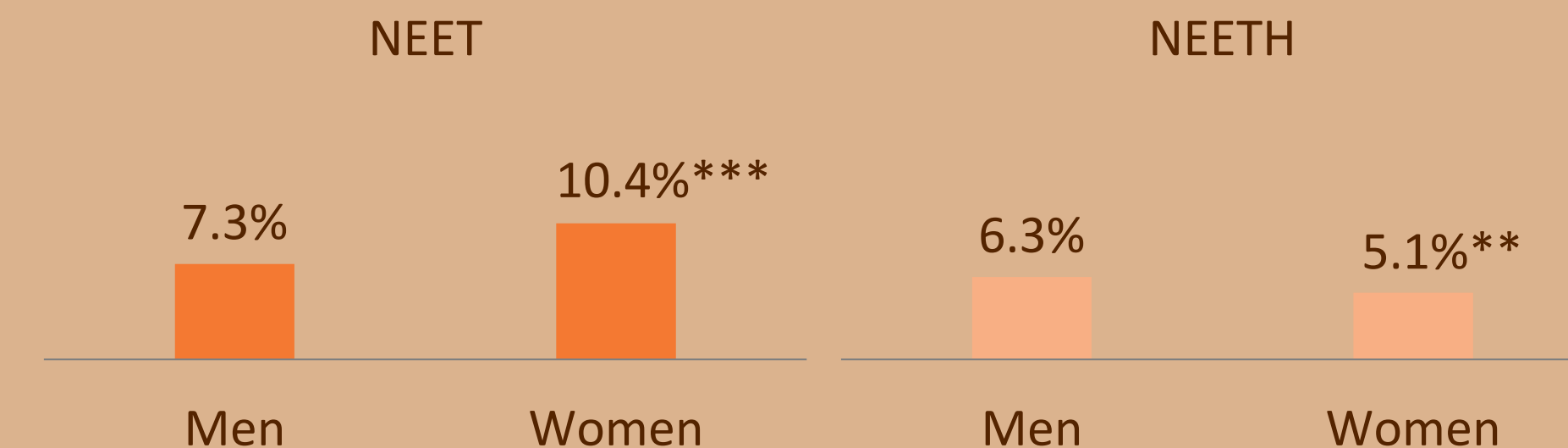
Specifying homemakers as NEET and capping age at 24 masks the group struggling post-recession.

Specifying homemakers as non-NEET changes the relationship between gender and the risk of being a NEET.

Figure 2. Probabilities of Being a NEET or NEETH w/ Controls Among Those Aged 16-29 in the U.S. by Gender, 2017



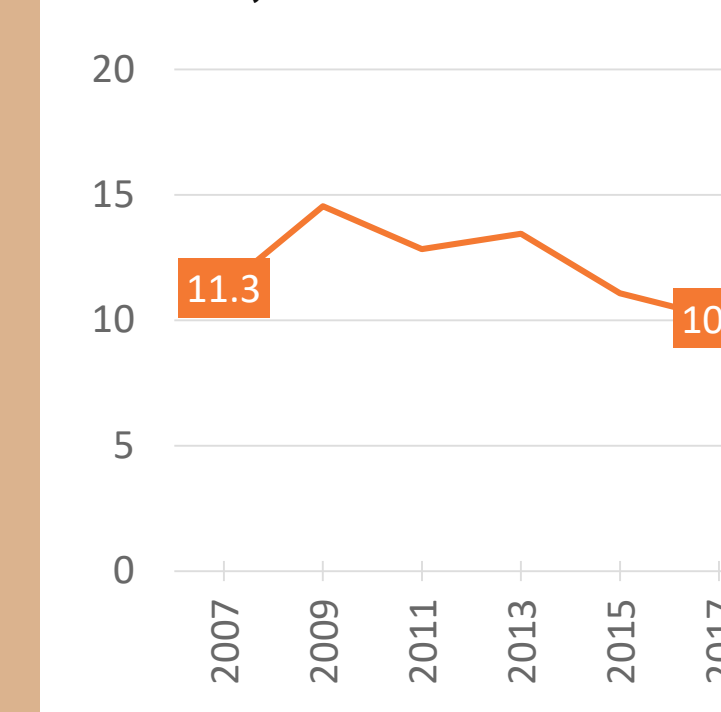
