


Crude divorce rate (divorces per 1,000 population) and recessions, 1950-2009












Refined divorce rates American Community Survey v. NCHS Vital Statistics 44 states

Recession mechanisms

- Increasing divorce
 - Stress
 - Economic hardship or shocks increase stress
 - Evidence from low earnings, and job loss
 - Housing crisis effects unknown
- Decreasing divorce
 - Costs of divorce
 - Job loss, lower income, create barriers to divorce
 - Housing crisis effects on ability to divide households
 - Resilience
 - "...deepened my commitment my marriage" (Wilcox hypothesis)


Divorce data


- American Community Survey 2008-2009
 - Age 15+
 - Married, or divorced within past 12 months
 - Living in the U.S. 1 year earlier
 - Coded into states according to residence 1 year earlier
 - i.e., immigrants this year excluded
 - Person weights

Recession data

- State annual unemployment rates
- House Price Index from FHFA
 - Same-house sales among single-family homes
 - 1991 = 100; annual average of quarterly values
- Foreclosure rate from RealtyTrac
 - Percent of housing units with foreclosure filing
- Real estate crisis outliers
 - California, Nevada, Arizona, Florida


Housing crisis outlier states






Housing crisis outlier states

Regressions

- Population-weighted state-years (N = 102; 94)
- Level (lagged) and change of each state-level measure

Results

- No significant effects except home price change
 - Lower divorce rates in states with greater home-price declines
 - But: only in model with outliers removed
