Retaining items in surveys as budgets tighten Support from users for survey data is key (e.g., SIPP)

We need to identify the bare minimum

We need to be ready to defend the need for particular data—links to specific programs, laws, or governments that require the information

Make use of links to administrative data, or other efficiencies



Dissolution of cohabitation

Need further work to better understand the murky edges of cohabitation spells

What are the salient features of the end of a cohabitation in relation to the outcomes we care about?

Well-being of the children involved

Well-being of the partners

Transition to marriage

Other outcomes we can measure in federal surveys?



Measuring the number of transitions children experience

As Raley notes, this requires more than dissolution dates/types.

Parent's fertility history

Parent's relationship history

(marriage & cohabitation & dating)

Child's residential history



Lack of monthly dissolution date
Discontinued due to disclosure issues
Mitchell 2010 points to noise in reporting of divorce dates
