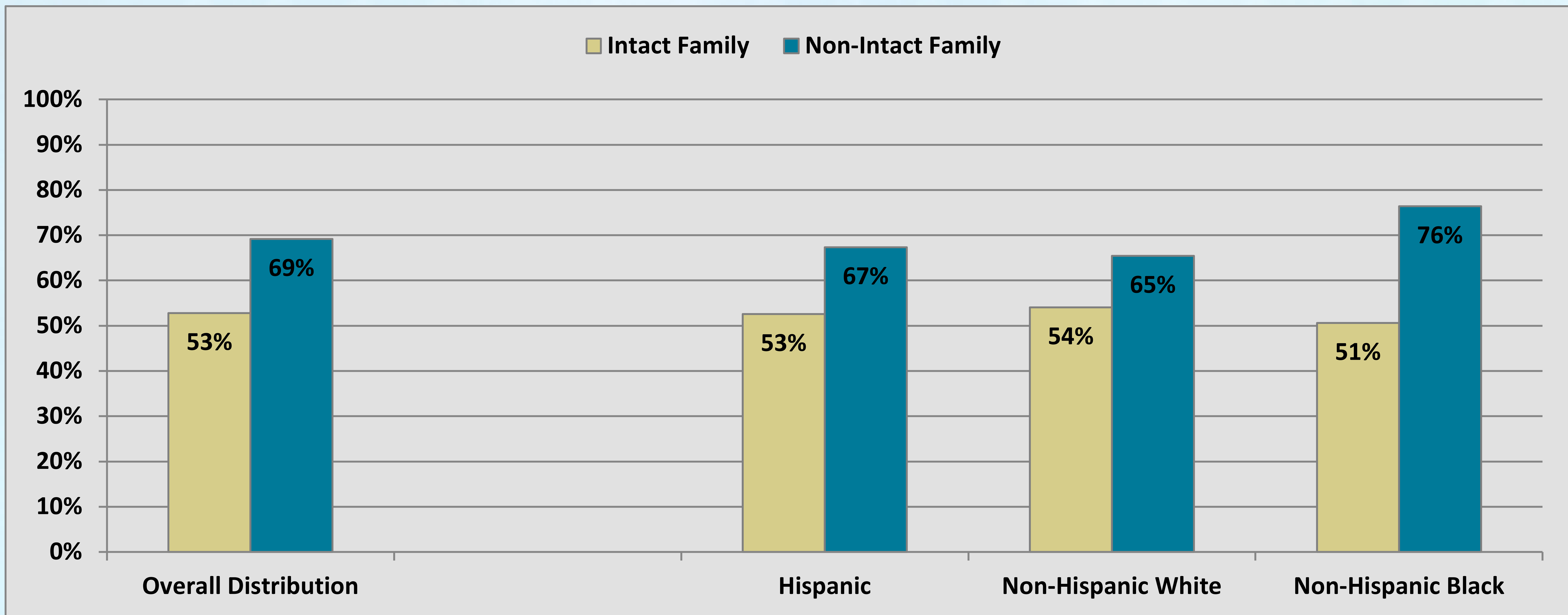




Teenage Male Favorable Attitudes Toward Non-Marital Childbearing: A Focus on Family and Race/Ethnicity

Notes:

1. Males indicated their level of agreement on a scale from (1) strongly agree to (4) strongly disagree with the following statement: It is okay for an unmarried female to have a child. Respondents who reported 'strongly agree' or 'agree' are coded as having a favorable attitude toward non-marital childbearing.
2. Respondents reported their parental living situation at age 14. Respondents who "lived with biological parents at age 14" are coded as intact families, and all other family types are coded as non-intact.
