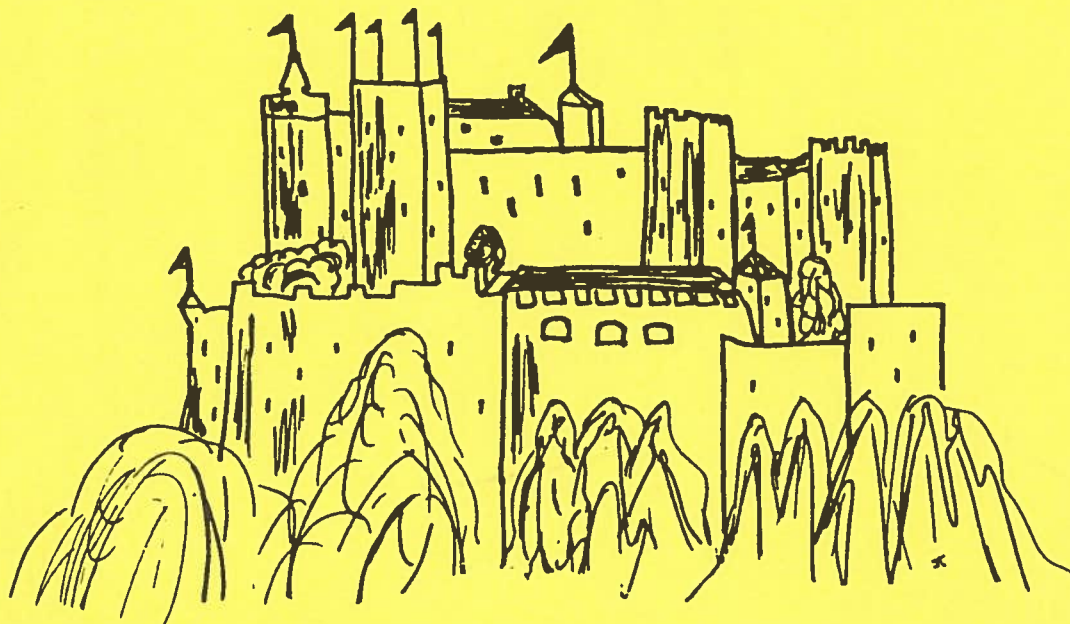

+ + NEWS FROM SALZBURG + +

- + This year 42 students will be going to Salzburg with the Bowling Green program: 32 undergraduates and 10 graduate students.
- + The director for 1980-81 is Dr. Margy Gerber. Dr. Klaus Schmidt just returned to Bowling Green after his 1979-80 stay in Salzburg.
- + The exchange rate is now 12 schillings to the dollar.
- + The cost of this year's program is \$3750, and still a bargain!
- + A new Mozarteum building was opened in 1979.
- + The group this year will vote on where they will be travelling. The itinerary will still include Wien and München, probably some cities in East Germany and perhaps Prague.
- + Students are living in six different dorms this year: Schwarzes Rössl, Billrothheim, Schloß Fronburg, Paracelsus, Egger-Lienz and St. Sebastian.
- + This summer a four week program for undergraduate students was started. The students earn college credit and are given five seminars to choose from: Phonetics, Business German, European Art, Salzburg Theater, and Advanced Translation, plus intensive work in German Language study.
- + Dr. Pellischek is the father of twin boys, born in the summer of 1979.



Dr. Wolfgang Steinitz, Art History professor for the Bowling Green program, died on January 26, 1979 in Salzburg of a heart attack. He was 39 years old and had been on the faculty of the University of Salzburg's Institute of Art History since its founding. He studied Art History, History, Archaeology and Folklore at the Universities of Munich and Vienna. Besides his numerous scholarly publications, he is well remembered for his Salzburg tourbook, entitled "Salzburg. Kunst- und Reiseführer." He is survived by his wife and two sons. Dr. Steinitz will doubtlessly be remembered by every student who took his course as one of the most energetic and friendly members of our program staff. He frequently accompanied the groups on their trip to Vienna, during which the astonishing breadth and wealth of his knowledge, as well as the engaging warmth of his personality, became apparent to all.

In memory of Dr. Steinitz, we are establishing a "Salzburg Memorial Scholarship Fund." The purpose of the scholarship will be to help at least one student each year who, for financial reasons, would not otherwise be able to participate in the Salzburg program. The funds previously donated in memory of James Stoffers (1975-76) will also be used towards this end. Contributions will be tax-exempt.

Until such time as the fund contains sufficient funds, the scholarship will necessarily be modest in amount. If anyone who reads this newsletter would like to help in raising funds for the scholarship, please indicate this in the enclosed reply page. Naturally any contributions from our own circle will be gratefully appreciated.

Note: Following Dr. Gauerke's retirement, a book award fund was established in his honor. After his death last year this fund was changed into the "Herbert J. Gauerke Memorial Book Scholarship Fund." Through the generosity of Hazel Gauerke and the many friends and former students of Dr. Gauerke, a book scholarship is now given each year to an outstanding student in German at Bowling Green State University.

Deutsch für Ausländer an der Alma Mater Paridiana  
(Rückblick und Vorschau)

Begonnen hat es mit drei Stunden in der Woche, gehalten von Dr. Seidlhofer. Drei Stunden für Hörer, die Deutschkenntnisse von Null bis Dissertantenniveau aufzuweisen hatten! Heute halten wir bei 36 (sechsenddreißig) Wochenstunden, das sind fünf sechsstündige Lehrveranstaltungen und sechs Laborstunden. Mit den Lehraufträgen sind die Lektoren Dr. Arrer, Dr. Bapka, Dr. Fleischhacker, Dr. Höller und Mag. Stuppnik-Bazzanella betraut. Vorwiegend gebührt der Dank für diese gewaltige Erweiterung dem gegenwärtigen Dekan der Geisteswissenschaftlichen Fakultät, Professor Walter Weiss, der in Gesprächen mit der hier Unterzeichneten wiederholt die Bedeutung der starken Bowling Green Delegation unter unseren ausländischen Hörern hervorgehoben hat.

Die Beurteilung unserer Arbeit (jener der genannten Lektoren) sei wie bisher auch weiterhin den Studenten vorbehalten. Das Verdienst der Studenten von Bowling Green als "harter Kern", andere Kommilitonen zum kontinuierlichen Erscheinen und der gelegentlich bis ins Enthusiastische hinein gesteigerten Mitarbeit anzuregen und mitzureißen, habe ich selbst nie versäumt zu betonen. Dr. Herbert J. Gauerke passed away on October 20, 1979 in Saline, Michigan at the age of 74. A memorial service was held for him on November 14, 1979 in Prout Chapel at Bowling Green State University. Dr. Gauerke was born on April 20, 1905 in Embarass, Wisconsin. He began teaching at BGSU in 1964 and retired in 1974. He also taught 15 years each at Marquette University and Eastern Michigan University. In addition to his teaching, Dr. Gauerke served with the American Occupation Forces in West Germany following World War II and was instrumental in getting the German press back on its feet. He is survived by his wife, his daughter, four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

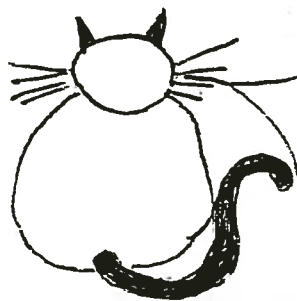

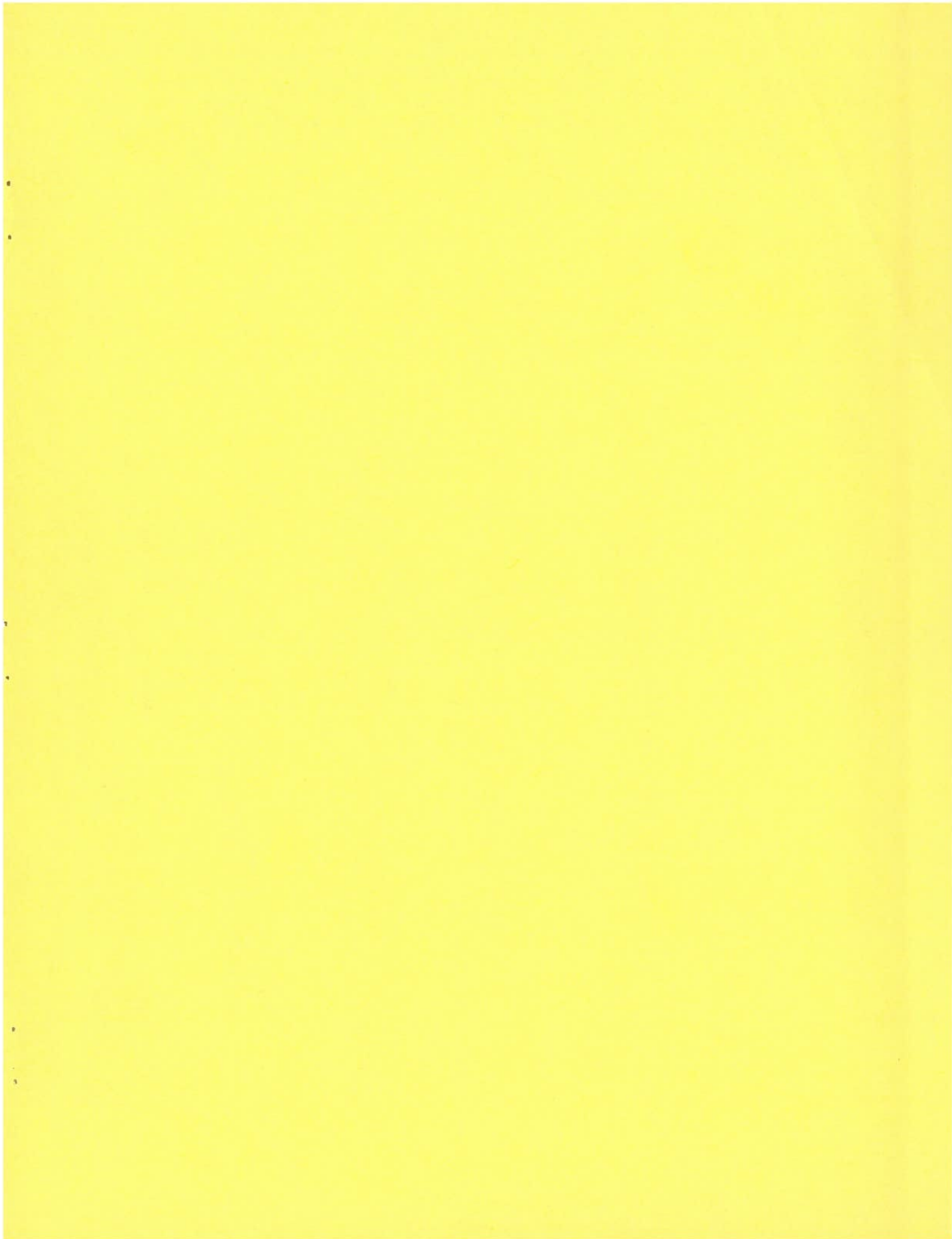

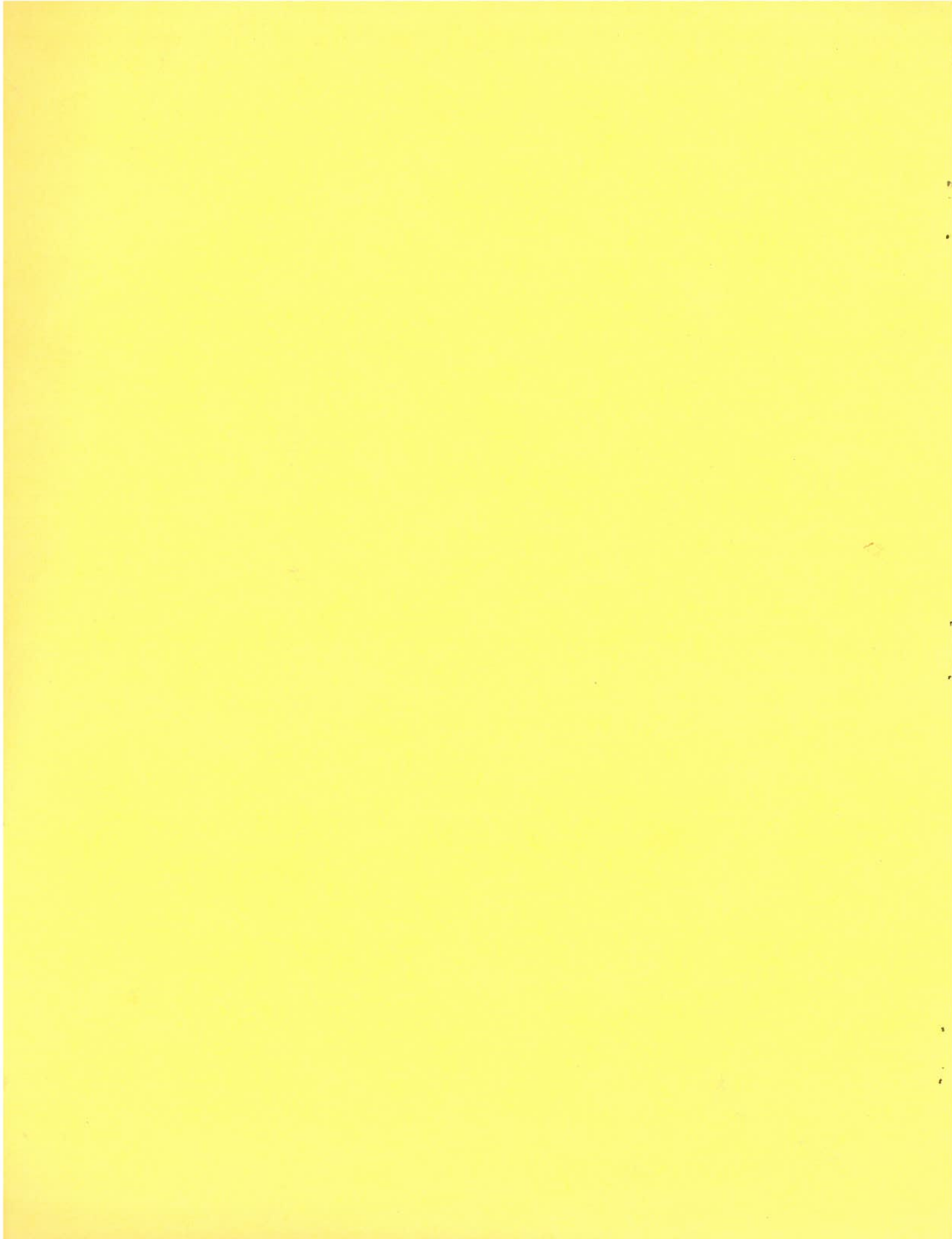
