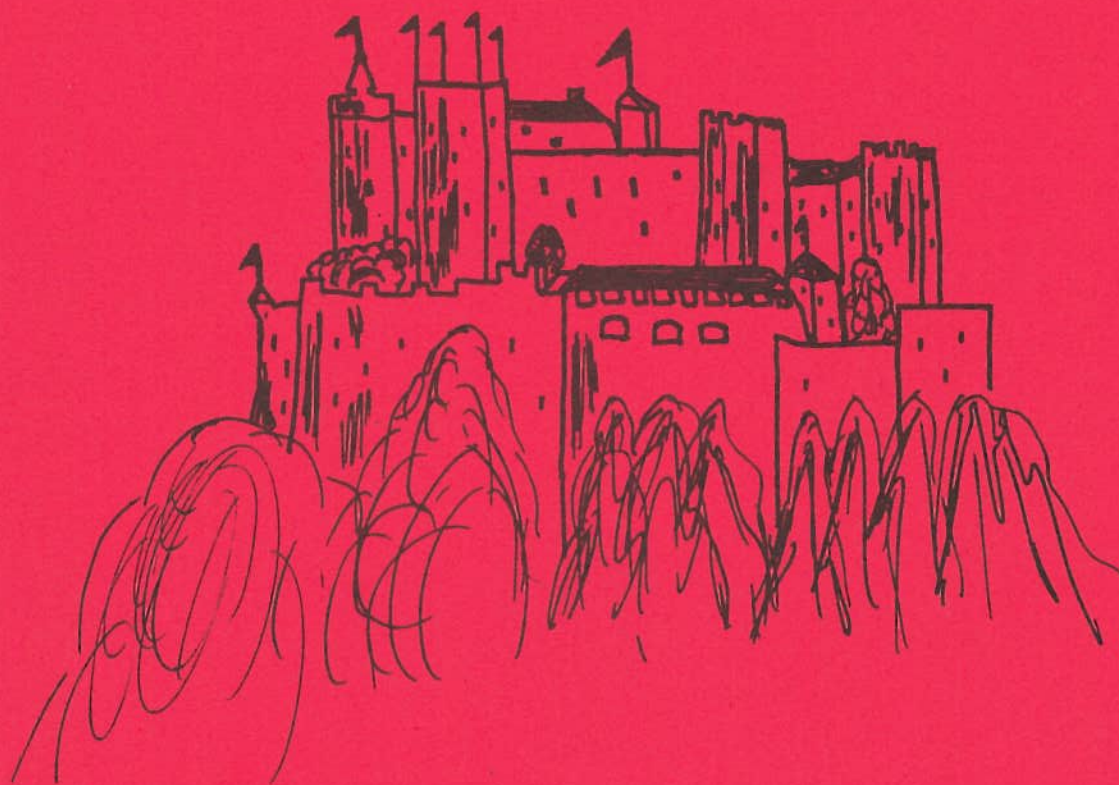

## INTRODUCTION

The Bowling Green State University Academic Year in Salzburg, Austria, is designed to help American students perfect language skills in German and gain first-hand knowledge of the culture of German speaking countries, while earning college credit in a variety of subject areas. Classes are taught in German by Austrian and American professors. Students are housed in dormitories with Austrian students.

The Bowling Green Salzburg Program is the only American program offered with the sponsorship of the University of Salzburg. The program will be in its tenth consecutive year of operation during 1977-78. A new feature of the program is its liaison with the Mozarteum, one of the finest schools of music in Europe. Qualified students of music enrolled in the program may now receive instruction at the Mozarteum.

The University of Salzburg, originally founded in 1622 and re-opened in 1962, offers courses in the liberal arts, sciences, law and theology. The city of Salzburg, with a population of 140,000, is equally famous as a cultural center and as a vacation city. For years Salzburg's music and drama festivals (Salzburger Festspiele) have attracted visitors from all over the world, and the nearby mountains offer excellent facilities for hiking and skiing. Salzburg is located in the northcentral section of Austria, in the heart of central Europe, and is only a few short hours from Munich, Vienna, Prague, Venice, Innsbruck, and many other well-known European cities.

The BGSU Salzburg Program is a nine-month period of academic studies, divided into two semesters, and carrying no less than 30 semester (45 quarter) hours of credit. Some of the features that recommend the program to the interested student are:

- 1) The student need not be a German major or minor to participate.
- 2) The program offers a balanced curriculum consisting of courses in the German language, literature and culture, as well as offerings in history, music, art, education, political science, and geography.
- 3) Linguistically qualified students may also enroll in regular University of Salzburg courses in lieu of some of the program offerings.
- 4) The program is supervised by an American professor familiar with American and European university life.
- 5) Group travel to places of cultural interest and group outings are regular features of the program; yet, the generous vacations at Christmas, Easter and between semesters allow ample time for independent travel.
- 6) Housing arrangements encourage contact with Austrian students (in most cases, participants will have an Austrian roommate).
- 7) In general, the program offers the opportunity, while still a student, to spend a year in Europe. Former students look back on this experience as one of the best things that has ever happened to them!

## ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

The BGSU Salzburg Program is open to students from all accredited colleges and universities who (1) are in good academic standing at their home institution, (2) will have sophomore standing, and (3) will have completed at least two years of college German, or the equivalent, by the time the program begins.

Participants will be asked to use German throughout their study abroad. All students are expected to abide by regulations governing the program, and the sponsoring institutions reserve the right to require the withdrawal of any student whose personal or academic conduct, including excessive absences, warrants such action.

BGSU students planning to participate in the program should enroll in German 300 (Introduction to Study Abroad) for one credit hour in Spring Quarter, 1977.

## PROGRAM OF STUDIES

The list of course offerings on the opposite page represents the courses normally offered by the BGSU Salzburg staff. These courses are taught specifically for students in the BGSU program. While the list is subject to minor changes, students are assured that they will be able to earn at least 30 semester hours (45 quarter hours) for the academic year. The academic load for a regular undergraduate student will normally be a minimum of 15 hours per semester.

Other alternatives exist for obtaining academic credit in the Salzburg program. Students may engage in study projects, for example, in sociology or cultural anthropology, under a professor from their home institution, provided such projects are submitted for approval well in advance, and arrangements can be made to give Bowling Green credit for them.

Students who pass the language proficiency exam of the University of Salzburg also qualify to take courses regularly offered by the University of Salzburg. Students with two years of college German or the equivalent are generally able to pass this exam by the end of the first semester. Thus, during the second semester, qualified students may substitute one or two such courses (more in exceptional cases) in place of program-taught courses. Students planning to take regular University of Salzburg courses for credit will need to have a certain flexibility concerning specific course topics. (The catalogue of courses for the 2nd semester, for example, does not appear until January, a month or two before the semester begins.) A summary of previous course offerings in specific departments can be provided on request.

The university sports facilities and intra-mural sports programs are also available to students in the BGSU Salzburg program.

For regularly enrolled students of Bowling Green State University, all of the program courses listed will be credited as hours toward graduation. The German courses may be used towards a major, double major, or minor. (German 317 and 318 may be repeated for credit in Salzburg if the student has taken them prior to departure. German 417 and 418 may be also repeated for credit, either in Salzburg or following the student's return from Salzburg.) Non-German courses count as electives, and in some cases may be applied to group requirements. Students should meet with their academic advisors as soon as possible to plan their programs carefully so that all requirements can be met. Students from other colleges and universities should secure the approval of their study plans and courses abroad by their academic advisors and colleges as early as possible.

#### THE MOZARTEUM

In cooperation with the University of Salzburg and the Mozarteum, the BGSU Salzburg Program has several openings available at the Mozarteum for qualified students of music.

Classes are available in composition, music theory, conducting, keyboard instruments, string instruments, wind and percussion instruments, church music, voice and opera. Classes in the methodology of elementary music teaching are also offered in the Orff Institute, a special department of the Mozarteum. The language of instruction is German.

In addition, the Orff Institute offers a special program in English for teachers or prospective teachers of music, physical education and dance. Admission to this one-semester special program (Fall semester only) is highly selective, and applications must be submitted about ten months in advance. (Details available on request.)

In order to qualify for instruction at the Mozarteum, students must submit a certified tape of one of their performances. A panel of judges at the Mozarteum will make the final decision on admission. Interested students should contact the BGSU Salzburg Program as early as possible concerning the procedures to be followed.

#### LODGING AND MEALS

Students will be housed in clean, modern dormitories. To assure maximum use of the German language, an attempt is made for each student to have a German-speaking roommate. Students may eat where they choose. There are cooking facilities in the dormitories; there is the university cafeteria (quite inexpensive); and there are many restaurants in Salzburg where good food at reasonable prices may be obtained. Students are given daily food allowances, paid out weekly, to cover the cost of their meals. (Student reaction to this independent meal plan has been overwhelmingly favorable, and it is much preferred over the typical U.S. dormitory food arrangements.)

## TRAVEL WHILE ABROAD

There will be several educational-cultural group excursions paid for by the program. These trips may include such cities as Munich, Vienna, Berlin, Prague or Budapest, and some of the interesting sites near Salzburg. Students are free to travel individually during the holiday and recess periods. They may also remain in Europe after the end of the academic year, if they care to do so. Students travelling in Europe enjoy many financial advantages: reduced railway fares (Eurail or Interrail passes), inexpensive lodging at youth hostels, reduced admission fees to museums, tourist sights, theaters, etc.

## TRANSATLANTIC TRANSPORTATION

Students are free to arrange for their own transportation to and from Europe. The BGSU Salzburg Program will attempt to arrange for a special flight which would probably leave from Detroit or Cleveland in late September. The program director will keep those students who have been accepted informed about the group flight possibilities, the least expensive air and steamship fares, etc., as this information becomes available.

## COSTS OF PROGRAM

The overall fee for 1977-78 is expected to be \$2950.00 for residents of Ohio, and \$3550.00 for non-residents of Ohio. (These costs are subject to change.) The cost for one semester is one-half of the overall fee for residents, and \$1875.00 for non-residents.

Included in the overall fee for 1977-78 are the following: instructional and general fees, room (dormitory space) and costs of meals for 273 days (from October 1, 1977, to June 30, 1978, including vacation periods); cultural events, limited medical costs (see section on "Insurance"), some educational group travel on selected days and weekends during the academic year; use of student facilities at the University of Salzburg and the assigned dormitories, costs for specific courses taken at the University of Salzburg, and some concert and/or theater tickets.

Not included are: U.S. and transatlantic transportation, costs of lodging and food prior to October 1, 1977, and after June 30, 1978, fees for obtaining a U.S. passport; school supplies and books, vacation travel during regular vacation periods and before and after the academic year, and other incidental and personal expenses.

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

No special scholarships have been available for the BGSU Salzburg Program in the past. There is a possibility that a small number of modest scholarships will be offered to BGSU students in 1977-78. If these become available, applications will be accepted in late February. BGSU students who hold university or state scholarships may continue to hold these awards while in the Salzburg Program. Students who have other scholarships or loans should check with the sponsoring agency to see if they can be applied to the program costs.

Out-of-state students accepted into the program will receive a one-half fee waiver (= \$600). Non-resident fees for the full year would normally be \$1200.

## INSURANCE

Since many students have medical protection through family insurance plans, the purchase of additional coverage may not be required. However, the university does require that every student be insured through a trip accident and sickness policy and a trip personal effects policy, if such coverage is not included in another policy. All students must assume complete responsibility providing themselves with adequate insurance protection.

Medical facilities in Salzburg are very good and comparatively inexpensive. A limited number of medical services are paid for by the program; these include out-patient treatment for emergencies and office or house calls for minor illnesses or injuries. All other medically related expenses must be covered by the student's own insurance.

## SCHEDULE OF PAYMENTS

The application for admission to the BGSU Salzburg Program must be accompanied by a non-refundable application fee in the amount of \$25.00. This fee will be applied toward the total cost of the program, and will be refunded only if the applicant is not admitted to the program. When sent by check or money order, this payment and all payments listed below should be made out to Bowling Green State University.

All remaining payments are to be sent to the Office of the Bursar, Bowling Green State University. The payment schedule for students who wish to make their payments in installments is as follows:

The September, December, and March payments are comprised of the \$230.00 instructional fee and the \$56.00 general fee which are paid by all Bowling Green students.

A schedule of payments for students registering for one semester only will be mailed to those concerned.



### UNIVERSITY LIABILITY

Bowling Green State University reserves the right to make changes in dates, program costs, or courses, if it becomes necessary to do so. In the event the program is cancelled, a full refund of monies will be made. Any student who withdraws from the program after having been accepted forfeits the application fee. A schedule of refunds, in the event of subsequent withdrawal from the program, will be provided upon request.

Applications will be accepted starting immediately. Although there is no official deadline for applications, students are urged to apply as early as possible. The size of the group is limited, and selection is based on the credentials submitted.

Students from institutions other than Bowling Green must submit a transcript of their college work, including grades for the Fall Semester (or Quarter), 1976. Please arrange for the prompt transmittal of these transcripts to the address listed above.

All applicants are requested to arrange for three letters of recommendation to be sent to the same address above. One letter should be from a recommender who is familiar with their proficiency in German, one from a person who is familiar with their general academic background, and one from someone who knows them well. If one recommender qualifies in two categories, only two letters need be sent. The first two letters are especially important for students with average grades; the second letter should also address itself to the applicant's academic maturity; the third letter to the applicant's general maturity, ability to adapt, and sense of responsibility. All recommenders are requested to give their opinion on the applicant's suitability and readiness for the year of study in Salzburg. The letters may be brief and informal.

Applicants will be notified within three weeks whether their application has been approved, rejected, or delayed. Approval for courses at the Mozarteum will take longer (see the section on "The Mozarteum").

A SPECIAL NOTE ON THE BGSU SUMMER GERMAN CLUSTERS

Students desiring an intensive experience in the German language and culture are invited to enroll in one of BGSU's Summer German Clusters. Cluster I is a ten-week program (June 20 - August 26, 1977) which offers as a core the equivalent of first year college German. Students may earn up to twenty quarter hours credit. Cluster II is a five-week program (June 20 - July 22, 1977) which offers Intermediate German for eight hours credit.
