Dear Alumni and Friends,

We have received many kind responses from you, and now our trusty Salzburg Assistant, Sue Sidor, is preparing another *Salzburg Newsletter*. It is wonderful to stay in touch with you all and to hear about new developments near and far.

This week our current Salzburg Director Dr. Kristie Foell will be taking her students to Berlin on their final big outing of the year. The next group of undergraduate and graduate Salzburg participants is preparing for the year in Austria now. We, again, have recruited an international group of students with participants from the U.S. and Canada as well as from Armenia, Moldova, Russia and India. I expect 12 undergraduates and 10 graduate students to arrive in Salzburg in late September. Three qualified BGSU undergraduate AYA participants will receive stipends through the Dr. Dzidra Shllaku Scholarship Fund. A big thank-you to all who continue to support this valuable AYA scholarship fund that affords BGSU students the opportunity to study in Salzburg.

There are several new developments that I would like to share with you. Our ties with the University of Salzburg continue to stay strong as we invite program faculty members to teach at the Bowling Green campus this summer. In late June both Professors Stuppnik-Bazzanella and Pellischek-Wilsdorf are due to arrive in Ohio. Professor Pellischek will teach in the College of Education during the second summer session once again after a successful semester last summer. Professor Stuppnik-Bazzanella will serve as a special guest instructor during our Humanities Institute for German Teachers at the end of June. She will be visiting the campus for the first time after almost 20 years as DaF professor to our AYA Salzburg students. We look forward to hosting both of these valued colleagues. We are also planning an Austrian Week at BGSU in the Fall and hope to welcome the Chair of the *Institut für Anglistik und Amerikanistik*, Professor Dr. Dorothea Steiner, and AYA Salzburg program colleagues Dr. Pellischek, Dr. Mittermayer and Dr. Slupetzky here in Northwest Ohio.

The highlight of the year was undoubtedly the establishment of a new internship program in Austria that provides qualified graduate and undergraduate students the opportunity to gain practical work-experience. In the summer of 1999, our Resident Director Professor Dr. Pellischek presented his idea of augmenting the study-abroad experience by providing opportunities for our students to apply their newly acquired communicative competence and cultural proficiency within a professional context in Austria and Germany. Working with incredible speed and diligence, Professor Pellischek succeeded in establishing 6 different internship possibilities, and at least 4 students were able to complete internships during the past academic year. They will

receive certificates once they have completed a self-assessment, the official Austrian Business German Exam, and a paper outlining and discussing this professional experience as it relates to their graduate education in German and the humanities. One of the internships is with the *ORF*, the National Austrian Broadcasting Company, and another entails serving as liaison personnel in the marketing branch of a Hallein mechanical engineering plant with partner firms in the Midwest. A third offers students training in the area of gerontology. Other internships provide students with hands-on experience within Austrian/German political parties, the hotel industry, teaching institutions or charity organizations. For the next year, our resident director has already developed at least 8 different internship programs! **In Memoriam: Jennifer Steinscherer (born Derk) 1964-1999**  
**AYA Salzburg Program 1984-85, MA in German, BGSU 1991**

Jennifer Derk came to the AYA program from Radford University in Virginia. A journalism student, she quickly improved her German at the Goethe Institute in Rothenburg in the summer of 1984. Jennifer spoke German with fluency and enthusiasm, and her sweet Virginia accented Salzburger Dialekt became her trademark.

Jennifer met Salzburger Anton Steinscherer in October of 1984. The pair courted for nine years on both sides of the Atlantic, and they were married at Schloß Mirabell in 1993. They lived in Eugendorf and later in Salzburg, where Jennifer taught English and translated German.

After finishing her BA at Radford in 1988, Jennifer came to BGSU for her MA in German. Her studies were challenged by the collapse of East Germany (original thesis: "Censorship in the DDR"), and advancing health difficulties. She reworked the thesis, completed her MA, and returned to Anton in 1992.

Jennifer was a spontaneous woman with a clever, quirky sense of humor. Few of Jennifer's friends knew her zest for life belied a tragic heart condition. In September 1999, Jennifer and Anton's hopes were dashed when a long-awaited transplant failed in Vienna. Jennifer is survived by her husband, Anton Steinscherer in Salzburg, and by her sister, Laura Hart in Salem, VA.

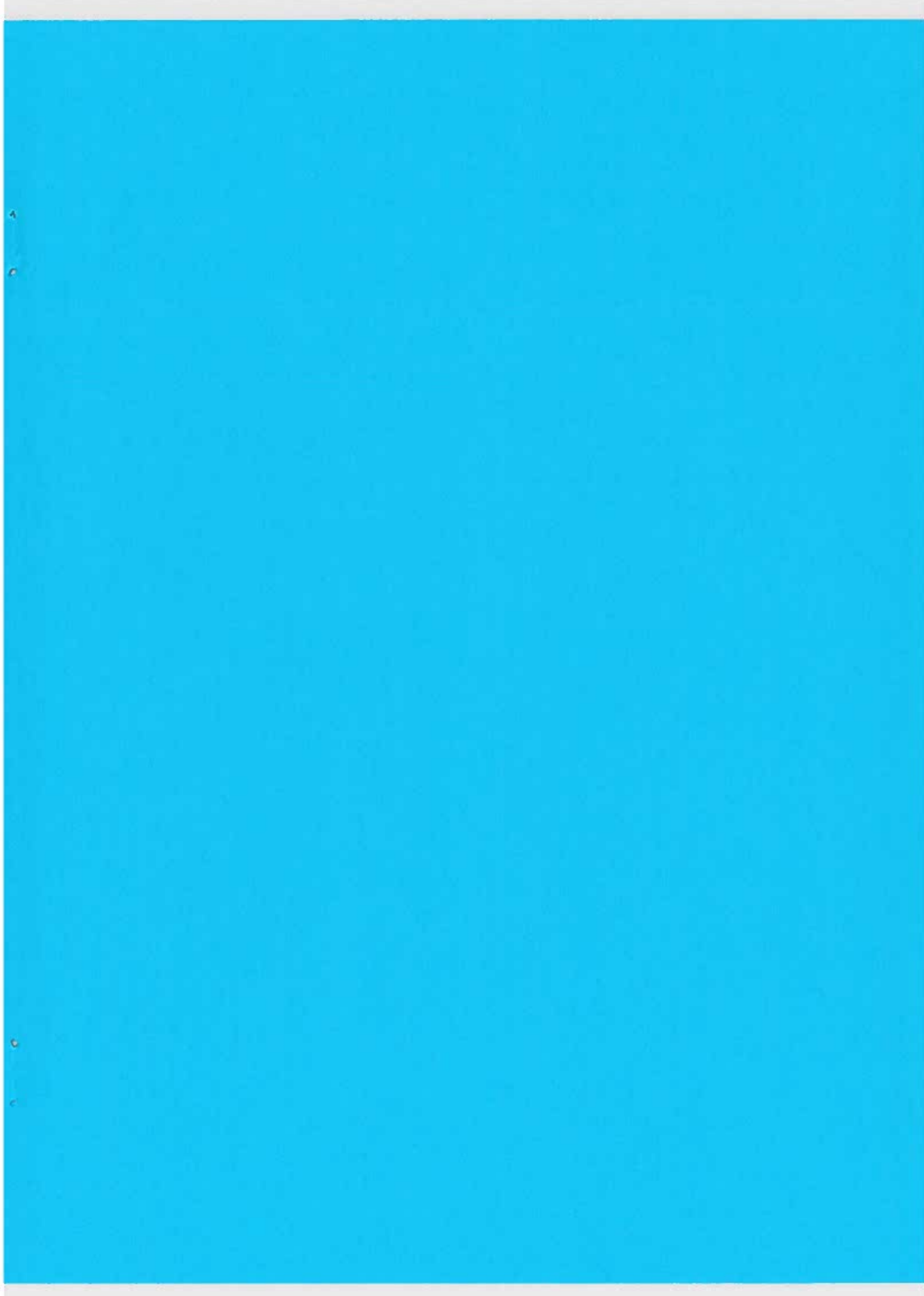

the 1990s, the number of people with a mental health problem has increased in the UK (Mental Health Act 1983, 1990).

There is a growing awareness of the need to improve the lives of people with mental health problems. The Department of Health (1999) has set out a strategy for mental health care in the UK. The strategy is based on the following principles:

- People with mental health problems should be treated as individuals.
- People with mental health problems should be given the opportunity to participate in decisions about their care.
- People with mental health problems should be given the opportunity to live in their own homes.
- People with mental health problems should be given the opportunity to work and to contribute to society.
