And, true to his form and completely belying the suffering he was experiencing, Eric regaled us with his special humor, his love and his camaraderie. Eric was always a special magnet that brought us together and kept us together -- it was impossible to feel anything but warmth and connectedness to each other when Eric was in our midst. To say "we will miss him" seems so inadequate, so understated. And for him to want to see us and be with us in his final months was an honor that each of us will cherish forever. Remembering R. Eric Moore

November 15, 1946 - October 13, 2002

R. Eric Moore, a past president of the Virgin Islands Bar Association and active civil defense litigation attorney in St. Croix, died Sunday, October 13, 2002, following a long illness. Mr. Moore had practiced law in the Virgin Islands since 1971 and regularly appeared in litigation before the U.S. District Court of the Virgin Islands and the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit. He was selected to the prestigious International Society of Barristers in 2001 and had participated as a member of the Board of Bar Examiners of the Virgin Islands since 1993. Mr. Moore was a past member of the Board of Directors of the Historical Society for the Third Circuit Court of Appeals and a member of the Third Circuit Task Force for Equal Treatment in the Courts, Commission on Race and Ethnicity. He had also served as a member of the Full Time U.S. Magistrate Selection Committee and Delegate to the Lawyers Advisory Committee for the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit (1989-1991). Mr. Moore was a member of the Defense Research Institute and American Bar Association. Mr. Moore came to St. Croix as an attorney with Volunteers in Service to America (VISTA) in 1971 after receiving his B.A. degree in 1968 from Bowling Green State University and his J.D. degree in 1971 from Ohio State University College of Law. Mr. Moore thereafter served as a staff attorney for Legal Services of the Virgin Islands and later became the first Territorial Court Public Defender for the island of St. Croix. Mr. Moore then served as an Assistant United States Attorney in St. Croix. Mr. Moore entered private practice with David V. O'Brien in 1978, forming the Law Firm of O'Brien and Moore. In 1981, when David V. O'Brien accepted appointment to the United States District Court Judgeship, Mr. Moore began practicing as the Law Offices of R. Eric Moore. Mr. Moore is survived by his wife, Michelle, and many other family members throughout the United States.

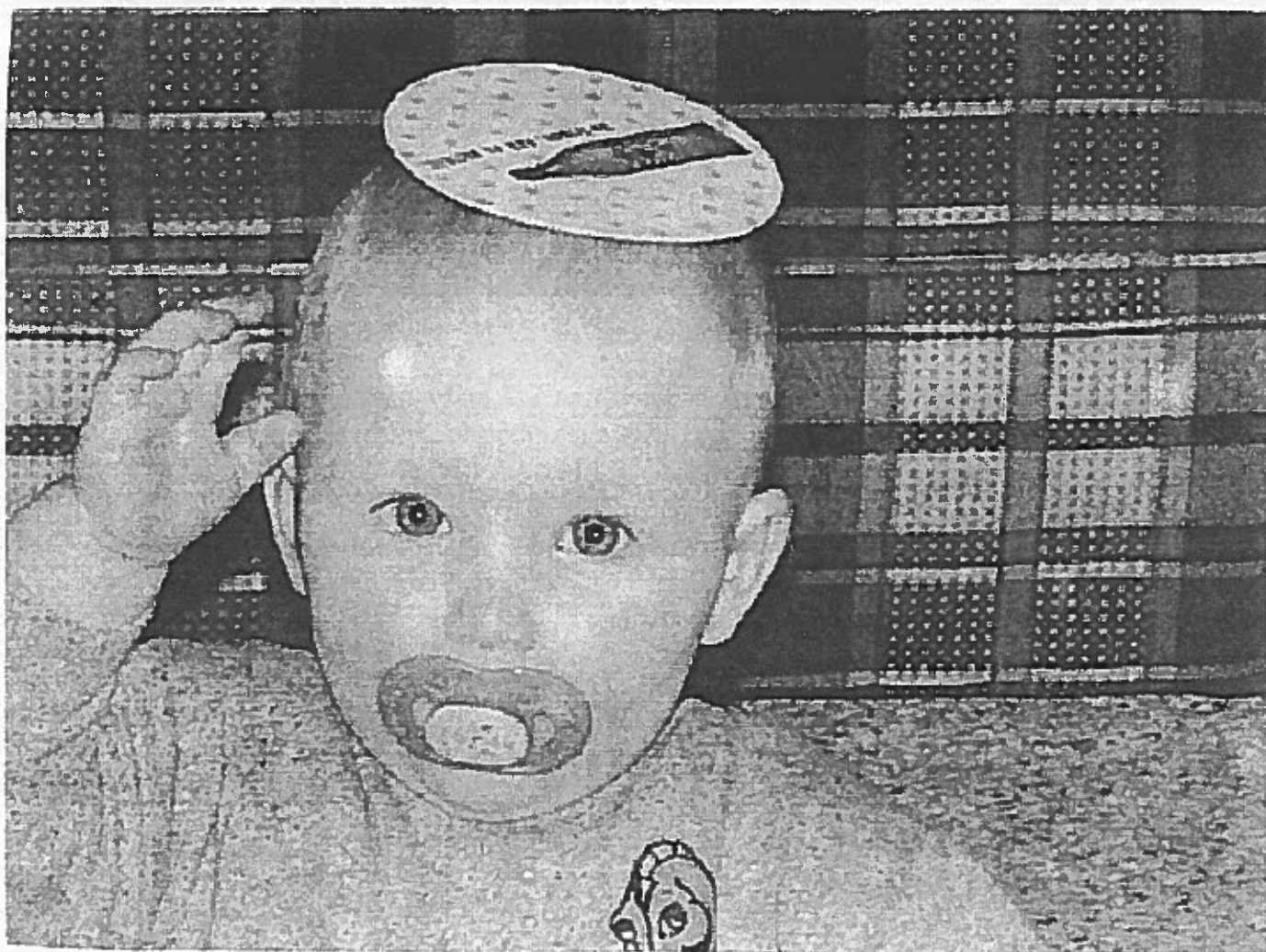
