Research Statement

Media historian focused on documenting and interpreting the history of documentary journalism in general and the NBC News Washington documentary unit in particular—the research includes writing original history of documentary processes, biographies of key documentary producers, developing and preserving the histories of programs, and expanding the field of documentary journalism history through archival scholarship. I co-founded the Documentary Division of the Broadcast Education Association (BEA) and was its first chair, 2005-08. I consult and assist with donations of archival material, including documentary films, television programs, photographs, production diaries, and other primary-source documents. I am particularly interested in the conceptual definitions of documentary forms, including distinctions between fiction and non-fiction.
