

Research Questions

- Do conservatives differ from other political stances in their attitudes towards law enforcement spending?
- Does the association vary by age?

Significance

- Current annual US law enforcement expenditures exceed \$180 million, without significant changes in crime rates (Gullapalli et al., 2019).
- Shifting some of these resources to other areas, such as education, could help lower overall crime rates.

Background

- Mixed past research findings.
- No significant crime deterrence due to increased law enforcement (Cloninger, 1975).
- Increased law enforcement leads to higher crime deterrence (McPheters & Stronge, 1974).
- Tough on crime and mass incarceration are questionable (Beckett et al., 2019)
- Conservatives are more likely than liberals to have a tough on crime stance (Chammah, 2016).

Hypothesis

- Conservatives are more likely than liberals to suggest that US spends too little on law enforcement.
- Older generations are more likely than younger ones to suggest that US law enforcement expenditures are too little, despite political stance.

Political Beliefs and Views of Law Enforcement Expenditures

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Data and Sample

- General Social Survey
- Conducted by National Opinion Research Center at University of Chicago
- Nationally representative of US adults 18 or older
- 2014 (N = 2,538), 2016 (N = 2,689), 2018 (N = 2,348)

Dependent Variable

- Attitudes on law enforcement expenditures (N = 3,758)
 - Is the US spending on law enforcement:

0	Too little	52.2%
0	About right	36.0%
0	Too much	11.8%

Independent Variable

- Respondents' political views
 - Do you see yourself as:

0	Liberal	28.0%
0	Moderate	39.0%
0	Conservative	33.0%

Control Variable

- Respondents' age
 - What is your age?
 18 34 26.0%
 35 49 25.0%
 50 64 27.0%
 65+ 22.0%

Analysis

 Cross tabulation and Chi-square tests using SPSS

Results

Figure 1. % Views of Law Enforcement Spending by Political Stance: Ages 18-34




Figure 2. % Views of Law Enforcement Spending by Political Stance: Ages 35-49




Figure 3. % Views of Law Enforcement Spending by Political Stance: Ages 50-64





Figure 4. % Views of Law Enforcement Spending by Political Stance: Ages 64+



Note: Chi-square test (χ 2 = 13.422, df = 4, p < .01)

Summary of Findings

- 52% of American adults reported that law enforcement spending is too little.
- Among those under age 50, conservatives are more likely than moderates and liberals to say law enforcement spending is too little.
- Among those age 50 or older, moderates are most likely to say law enforcement spending is too little.
- Young adults are more likely than older ones to say spending is too much.

Implications

- Not just conservatives may support mass incarceration.
- Further research on law enforcement spending and crime deterrence is required.
