Military Strain And Prescription Drug Misuse



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Military Deviance

With few exceptions, members of the military tend to report higher rates of problematic alcohol use, tobacco use, intimate partner violence (IPV), and prescription drug abuse than their civilian counterparts (Ames and Cunradi, 2018; Bondurant and Wedge, 2009; Department of Defense, 2008; National Institute on Drug Abuse, 2013, Klein, 2015).

Sources of Strain

- Military Culture (Masculinity Strain)
- Ex. Being in the military means you can't show emotion.
- Military Structure (Chain of Command Strain)
- Ex. Moving to a new base/deploying.
- Combination of Culture and Structure in the form of Lack of Control
- Ex. Disagreeing with orders from superiors.

Misuse Rates

- In 2008, 11 percent of service members reported misusing prescription drugs, up from 2% in 2002 and 4% in 2005.
- In 2008, 20% of military personnel reported binge drinking every week in the past month; the rate was considerably higher—27%—among those with high combat exposure.
- The 2010 report of the Army Suicide
 Prevention Task Force found that 29% of active duty Army suicides from fiscal year (FY) 2005 to FY 2009 involved alcohol or drug use; and in 2009, prescription drugs were involved in almost on- third of them.

Results of Study

- Military members who reported misusing prescription drugs while on duty reported higher rates of masculinity strain, chain of command strain, and lack of control strain.
- Military members who reported misusing prescription drugs also reported higher levels of temper/anger issues and anxiety than those who did not.
- Military members who experience masculinity strain are associated with a 96% increase in the odds of prescription drug misuse.
- Military members who experience lack of control strain are associated with a 39% increase in the odds of prescription drug misuse.
