

# **BIOGRAPHIES**



Solungga Liu has been acclaimed as a pianist of great breadth. She is a champion of early twentieth-century American music and underrepresented works of the standard repertoire. She is also known as an uncanny interpreter of new music. Her November 2017 debut at the Library of Congress was praised for its "rhythmic precision, expression and a finely

calibrated sense of balance between all of the moving parts." There she performed a solo recital of works by Charles Griffes, Amy Beach and César Franck, a concert tailored to her strengths and uniquely composed of music from the Library's manuscript collection. Liu's recording, "The Pleasure-Dome of Kubla Khan: Piano Works of Charles Tomlinson Griffes" for Centaur Record, led to the special request by the Library of Congress that she premiered Griffes's 1915 piano transcription of Debussy's *Les parfums de la nuit* from his orchestral work Iberia, once thought lost by Griffes's biographers.

A dedicated performer of new music, Liu has performed numerous composers of our time, including Lutoslawski's *Piano Concerto* with OSSIA, Steve Reich's *The Desert Music* and *Tehillim* with Alarm Will Sound, *Meandering River* and *Three Braided-River* for solo piano by Robert Morris, and Aaron Travers's *Concierto de Milonga*, written for her and the Indiana University New Music Ensemble. She recorded two CDs of Reich's major works with AWS, and Albany Records released her recording of *Meandering River*. In addition, Liu premiered and recorded Gregory Mertl's *Piano Concerto* commissioned by the Barlow Endowment for her, conductor Craig Kirchhoff and the University of Minnesota Wind Ensemble. The 2017 Bridge Records release has received great praise from the American Record Guide, Toronto's WholeNote and Fanfare.

Liu holds a doctoral degree in piano performance from the Eastman School of Music and is Associate Professor of Piano at Bowling Green State University.



Winners of both the First Prize and Amadeus Prize at the London International String Quartet Competition, **Formosa Quartet** is "one of the very best quartets of their generation" (*David Soyer, cellist, Guarneri Quartet*). Hailed as "spellbinding" (*BBC Music Magazine*) and "remarkably fine" (*Gramophone*), Formosa has given critically acclaimed performances at the Ravinia Festival, the Caramoor Festival, the Library of Congress, the Chicago Cultural Center, the Walter Reade Theater at Lincoln Center, and London's Wigmore Hall, and has recorded on the EMI, New World Records, Delos, and Bridge labels. Formed in 2002 when the four founding members came together for a concert tour of Taiwan, Formosa Quartet is deeply committed to championing Taiwanese music and promoting the arts in the land of its heritage, as well as exploring diverse and adventurous mediums for string quartet.

The members of the Formosa Quartet – <u>Jasmine Lin</u>, <u>Wayne Lee</u>, <u>Che-Yen Chen</u>, and <u>Deborah Pae</u> – have established themselves as leading solo, chamber, and orchestral musicians.
