# Approval of Report to Ohio Department of Education: Course Evaluation Based on Enrollment and Performance (HB 64) No. 23-2016

- WHEREAS, Pursuant to Ohio Revised Code (ORC) section 3345.35, "Not later than January 1, 2016, . . . the board of trustees of each state institution of higher education . . . shall evaluate all courses and programs the institution offers based on enrollment and student performance in each course or program. For courses with low enrollment, as defined by the chancellor of higher education, the board of trustees shall evaluate the benefits of collaboration with other institutions of higher education, based on geographic region, to deliver the course";
- WHEREAS, each board of trustees is required to submit its findings to the chancellor of higher education ("chancellor");
- WHEREAS, in Fall 2015, BGSU conducted an evaluation of all courses and programs that the institution offered based upon enrollment, identifying those courses with low enrollment, as outlined in HB 64 (ORC 3345.35);
- WHEREAS, all individual course sections offered at BGSU for two academic years (2014 and 2015) were examined to identify low enrolled courses/sections;
- WHEREAS, of 3153 total courses offered in academic year 2015, 581 (18%) met the HB 64 criteria for a "Low Enrolled Course";
- WHEREAS, deans, department chairs, and school directors were then asked to evaluate their low enrolled courses and recommend appropriate actions, which included "no action needed", possible curriculum revision/elimination, course and/or section management, possible collaboration with other BGSU programs or other institutions of higher education;
- WHEREAS, the analysis has illuminated potential internal and external collaborations in the following areas: business, calculus, communications, education, geography, languages, physics, political science, and research methods;

- WHEREAS, BGSU and the University of Toledo have a strong history of collaborating on programmatic offerings and have participated in ongoing discussions on how to collaborate on new programmatic offerings; and
- WHEREAS, compiling these findings and recommendations, BGSU has prepared the required report for submission to the chancellor and presents it to the BGSU Board of Trustees for its approval.
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees approves the Report to Ohio Department of Education: Course Evaluation Based on Enrollment and Performance (HB 64).

# Approval of Bachelor of Science in Forensic Science

#### No. 24-2016

- WHEREAS, at its meeting on May 3, 2013, the Bowling Green State University (BGSU) Board of Trustees authorized the President and the Vice President for Finance and Administration to negotiate agreements with the Ohio Attorney General for the construction of a Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI) forensic science laboratory and investigation facility on the Bowling Green campus;
- WHEREAS, the Ohio Attorney General's Office and the Ohio BCI have indicated a need and desire to have forensic science training in Ohio;
- WHEREAS, a survey of current BGSU students and BCI staff revealed a strong interest in degree programs in forensic science;
- WHEREAS, at its meeting on December 4, 2015, the BGSU Board of Trustees approved the development of a Master of Science in Forensic Science;
- WHEREAS, the Department of Chemistry proposes to institute a new degree program leading to a Bachelor of Science in Forensic Science (BSFS);
- WHEREAS, the rationale for this proposal is derived, in part, from contemporary and complementary issues of high levels of crime, advances in scientific methods for uncovering evidence and identifying criminal offenders;
- WHEREAS, the BSFS will focus on forensic science with three major areas of specialization: Forensic Biology, Forensic Chemistry, and Forensic Examination;
- WHEREAS, increasingly, employers are seeking students graduating from university programs recognized by the Forensic Science Education Programs Accreditation Commission (FEPAC) to ensure proper academic grounding;
- WHEREAS, BGSU Forensic Science programs must achieve FEPAC recognition to be considered among the elite group of institutions currently accredited in order to attract upper echelon students and place top-tier graduates;
- WHEREAS, with the addition of the BCI laboratory and investigation facility on the BGSU campus, and the formal partnership established between the Ohio Attorney General and BGSU in the form of the Center for the Future of Forensic Science, BGSU is uniquely positioned to achieve FEPAC recognition and to provide our students with the education and hands-on experience desired by today's forensic science employers;
- WHEREAS, the proposed BSFS has received the support of the Departments of Biology, Chemistry, and Criminal Justice; and
- WHEREAS, at its meeting on January 19, 2016, the Bowling Green State University Faculty Senate approved the proposal for the Bachelor of Science in Forensic Science program.
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees approves the proposed Bachelor of Science in Forensic Science program.

#### Approval of Bachelor of Arts in Philosophy, Politics, Economics and Law (PPEL)

#### No. 25-2016

- WHEREAS, Bowling Green State University (BGSU) offers a minor in Philosophy, Politics, Economics, and Law (PPEL) this is growing in popularity and enrollment;
- WHEREAS, a PPEL major will bring to BGSU the increasingly popular full course of study that emphasizes the importance of questions that lie at the intersection of these fields, primarily those concerning how political or economic institutions operate and how they should operate;
- WHEREAS, a BGSU PPEL major will offer our students the opportunity to join students across the nation in approaching political and economic questions as an integrated whole;
- WHEREAS, the major in PPEL is an interdisciplinary undergraduate major that provides students with an integrated curriculum, drawing on the methods and insights of philosophy, political science, and economics;
- WHEREAS, the program's aim is to provoke critical reflection on the relationship between different institutions political, legal, social, and economic;
- WHEREAS, the program will emphasize grappling with the moral and historical bases of political and economic life, while also equipping students with rigorous analytic thinking skills that are increasingly important in business, policy, law, and other fields;
- WHEREAS, the PPEL program will substantially broaden the university's portfolio of interdisciplinary programs;
- WHEREAS, in addition to foundational and core coursework, students in the PPEL program will take additional courses in one of three tracks: Law, which is proposed as a major option in BGSU's pre-law program; Ethics and Policy, which emphasizes applied ethics; and National and International Perspectives, which provides and introduction to government and NGO work; and
- WHEREAS, at its meeting on January 19, 2016, the Bowling Green State University Faculty Senate approved the proposal for the Bachelor of Arts degree in Philosophy, Politics, Economics, and Law.
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees approves the proposed Bachelor of Arts degree in Philosophy, Politics, Economics, and Law.

# Approval of Bachelor of Arts in Biology

# No. 26-2016

- WHEREAS, biological sciences is a popular area of study at Bowling Green State University (BGSU), both as a major and minor;
- WHEREAS, BGSU currently offers a Bachelor of Science degree program in Biology;
- WHEREAS, offering a Bachelor of Arts in Biology will allow a greater number of students to take advantage of the biological sciences programs without the advanced mathematics, chemistry, and physics courses required in the Bachelor of Science program;
- WHEREAS, students in the Bachelor of Arts program will be expected, instead, to take additional courses in social sciences, arts, and humanities in order to meet the minimum required number of credits for BGSU bachelor's degrees;
- WHEREAS, it is expected that this new degree option will attract 12 additional biology majors each year;
- WHEREAS, a Bachelor of Arts in Biology at BGSU will join a preexisting group of Ohio universities that have both a Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Arts option in biological sciences; and

- WHEREAS, at its meeting on November 3, 2015, the Bowling Green State University Faculty Senate approved the proposal for the Bachelor of Arts in Biology program.
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees approves the proposed Bachelor of Art in Biology program.

## Approval of Honorary Degree - Maribeth Sembach Rahe

#### No. 27-2016

- WHEREAS, Ms. Maribeth Sembach Rahe earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in Spanish from Bowling Green State University in 1970;
- WHEREAS, Ms. Rahe earned a master's degree in Business Administration in international management/finance with honors from Thunderbird School of Global Management;
- WHEREAS, Ms. Rahe currently serves as the Chief Executive Officer and President of Fort Washington Investment Advisors, Inc., a wholly owned subsidiary of Western & Southern Financial Group, based in Cincinnati, Ohio;
- WHEREAS, Fort Washington provides professional and comprehensive asset management services for institutions, corporations, insurance companies, mutual funds, foundations, endowments, and high-net-worth individuals;
- WHEREAS, under Rahe's leadership, Fort Washington is now the largest money manager of institutional assets in the Cincinnati region and employs more than 100 investment and support professionals;
- WHEREAS, prior to joining Fort Washington, Mr. Rahe was president and a board member of the United States Trust Company of New York;
- WHEREAS, Ms. Rahe also served as vice chair of the board of The Harris Bank in Chicago and has held various positions at JPMorgan in London and in New York;
- WHEREAS, having been called the first woman to shatter the highest "glass ceiling", Ms. Rahe was one of five female top executives in the Fortune 500 in 1997;
- WHEREAS, a well-known and acknowledged expert in financial services, Ms. Rahe was featured in a 1998 issue of *Vanity Fair* as one of "America's Most Influential Women—200 Legends, Leaders and Trailblazers";
- WHEREAS, Ms. Rahe serves on several regional and national boards of directors, including the Cincinnati Arts Association; Xavier University, Williams College of Business Board of Executive Advisors; Cincinnati USA Regional Chamber Foundation; First Financial Bank; Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center; New York Landmarks Conservancy; and National Tropical Botanical Garden;
- WHEREAS, Ms. Rahe received the YWCA Outstanding Achievement Award in 1991 and was inducted into the YWCA Leadership Academy of Chicago;
- WHEREAS, Ms. Rahe has been a corporate leader in the financial industry throughout her career, and by focusing on people and on the bottom line, she has been recognized as a visionary in the banking sector and in the communities in which she has lived; and
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees, in recognition of her outstanding business success and community engagement, confer upon Ms. Maribeth Sembach Rahe an honorary Doctor of Business Administration degree.

# Approval of Fiscal Year 2017 Residence Hall Room Rates

#### No. 28-2016

- WHEREAS, boards of trustees at public colleges and universities in Ohio are responsible for establishing the fees to be charged for room rates and related ancillary services;
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees hereby approves an average room rate increase of 2.4 percent as shown on Schedule 2 and Greek Parlor fees as shown on Schedule 5 to be effective for the fall semester of Fiscal Year 2017.

#### Approval of Fiscal Year 2017 Meal Plan Rates

#### No. 29-2016

- WHEREAS, boards of trustees at public colleges and universities in Ohio are responsible for establishing the fees to be charged for meal plans;
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees hereby approves a meal plan rate increase of 2.5 percent for the Bronze meal plan and increases for all other plans as shown on Schedule 1 to be effective for the fall semester of Fiscal Year 2017.

#### Approval of Fiscal Year 2017 Academic Special Course Fees

# No. 30-2016

- WHEREAS, it has been determined that the University's Academic Programs provide students with a worthwhile educational experience; and
- WHEREAS, it is important that the unique and increasing costs related to providing these instructional experiences continue to be adequately funded;
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees approves the special fees as listed on Attachment A effective for the fall semester of Fiscal Year 2017.

Approval to Renew Participation in the Local Administration Competency Certification Program for Capital Facilities Projects.

#### No. 31-2016

- WHEREAS, the 126<sup>th</sup> Ohio General Assembly enacted HB 16 establishing a Local Administration Competency Certification Program (the "Program") for the benefit of certain state-assisted institutions of higher education, including state universities; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 3345.51 of the Ohio Revised Code ("R.C."), the Program authorizes such institutions to administer state-funded construction, reconstruction, improvement, renovation, enlargement, or alteration of a public improvement under its jurisdiction without the supervision, control, or approval of the Ohio Department of Administrative Services; and
- WHEREAS, pursuant to R.C. 123.17 the Ohio State Architect's Office (the "SAO Program") may award local administration competency certifications to institutions of higher education and such certifications are required for participation in the Program; and

- WHEREAS, the Board has determined that it is in the best interest of the University to administer its own capital facilities projects in accordance with the requirements of both R.C. 3345.51 and R.C. 123.17 (the Program and the SAO Program hereinafter may be collectively or individually referred to as the "Local Administration Program"); and
- WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the University has adequate controls and sufficient personnel with the knowledge, skills, training, and professional certifications to satisfactorily participate in and manage the Local Administration Program in accordance with the requirements of the law;
- FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED, that among other authorities, the President or the Vice President for Finance and Administration is hereby delegated the authority to provide written notice to the Ohio Board of Regents, pursuant to R.C. 3345.51 (A)(2), to convey the Board's request to administer one or more specific capital facilities projects (as the President or Vice President for Finance and Administration may deem appropriate) within sixty days after the effective date of the section of an Act initially making an appropriation for the relevant project; and
- FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT, pursuant to the requirement set forth in R.C. 3345.51(A)(3), the University hereby states its intention to comply with R.C. 153.13 and the guidelines established pursuant to R.C. 153.16 and all laws that govern the selection of consultants, preparation and approval of contract documents, receipt of bids, and award of contracts with respect to each project subject to the requirements of the Local Administration Program; and
- FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT, pursuant to the requirement set forth in R.C. 123.17 (D)(6), and to the extent permitted by the Ohio State Constitution, the University agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the State and the Ohio Department of Administrative Services for any claim of injury, loss, or damage that results from the University's administration of a capital facilities project subject to the requirements of the Local Administration Program; and
- FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT, pursuant to the requirement set forth in R.C. 123.17 (D)(5), the University represents to the Ohio State Architect's Office that the University will conduct biennial audits of the University's administration of capital facilities projects in accordance with R.C. 3345.51(C), for such period of time as the University may be participating in the Local Administration Program; and
- FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED THAT, pursuant to the requirement set forth in R.C. 123.17 (D)(2), the Board hereby provides its assurance to the Ohio State Architect's Office that the University will select new employees to participate in the Local Administration Program as necessary to compensate for employee turnover; and
- NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board authorizes and directs the President or the Vice President for Finance and Administration to take such actions as may be necessary and appropriate to secure the University's certification for and successful participation in the Local Administration Program.

Ms. Morrison moved and Ms. Newlove seconded that the above four action items from the Financial Affairs/Facility Committee be approved. The Board Secretary conducted a roll call vote with the following results: Voting "yes" – Mr. Daley, Ms. Eisele, Mr. Keller, Mr. Levey, Ms. Montgomery, Ms. Morrison, Ms. Newlove, Mr. O'Brien, and Mr. Voll. The motion was approved with nine affirmative votes.

Ms. Morrison reported that Ms. Sheri Stoll gave presentations on five informational items including an Affordability and Efficiency Update; the University Investment Schedule through December 31, 2015; Capital Projects Status Report through December 31, 2015; E & G Expenditure Report through December 31, 2015; and Senate Bill 6 Ratios for Year-Ended June 30, 2015.

#### **AUDIT COMMITTEE**

Mr. Bailey reported that the only action item before the committee was the approval of minutes from the December 3, 2015, meeting. Discussion items on the agenda included a presentation from Ms. Monica Moll, Director of Public Safety and Chief of Police, an annual review of the Internal Audit Charter, a summary of fraud hotline statistics, a report on current audit findings, a correction action update, and an Audit Committee training topic.

#### DEVELOPMENT AND INVESTMENT COMMITTEE

Mr. Keller reported that there is one action item for Board consideration.

Approval of Revised University Investment Policy

No. 32-2016 Mr. Keller moved and Mr. Daley seconded that:

WHEREAS, the University maintains significant assets in a diversified investment portfolio, and

WHEREAS, the University has engaged the services of Mercer Investment Consulting to serve as investment advisor, and

WHEREAS, Mercer has performed an analysis of the University's long term investment goals and an indepth review of the University's current asset allocation and investment managers, and

WHEREAS, Mercer has presented their recommendations for adjusting the asset ranges contained in the investment policy to provide greater flexibility within the asset classes, and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Bowling Green State University Board of Trustees hereby approves the asset allocation adjustments as presented in the attached policy to be effective immediately and authorizes the Vice President for Finance and Administration to proceed with any efforts necessary to implement Mercer's recommendations relative to rebalancing the University's invested assets within the new ranges utilizing existing managers in a timely and prudent manner.

All signified in affirmative. Motion carried.

Mr. Keller reported that discussion items on the agenda included a review of market performance and December 31, 2015 investment schedule and a development and campaign update from Vice President Shea McGrew.

#### BGSU Firelands, Tom Tucker

Mr. Tucker provided an update to the Board on the success of the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary scholarship campaign. Firelands faculty, staff, and Advisory Board Members were contributors. Mr. Tucker also updated the Board of Phase II of the Allied Health and Sciences Project and the newly formed Firelands Leadership Council.

#### Administrative Staff Council Representative, Jeremy Joseph

Mr. Joseph thanked Dr. Mazey for presenting at the Administrative Staff meeting in January. He informed the Board that Administrative Staff Council assisted in Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service and also joined an ad hoc committee formed on House Bill 48.

#### Classified Staff Council Representative, Gail Houtz

Ms. Houtz informed the Board that she had been recently elected to complete the term held by Jan Garber. She noted Classified Staff Council's participation in the Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service, thanked Chair Levey for visiting their meeting, and stated that Vice President Stoll will be the guest at the next meeting that will be held at the Falcon Flight Center.
