Department Mission Statement

The Office of Campus Activities provides meaningful opportunities that connect students and families to the University community. We are committed to leadership development, personal growth, and learning experiences that empower students to reach their potential.

2013-14 Executive Summary

Staff from the Office of Campus Activities (OCA) focused on increasing student engagement. This was accomplished through more: student officers trained, students joining fraternities and sororities, attendance at late-night events, sold-out shows at the Stroh Center, and participation in Family Weekend. OCA staff provided leadership to the new Greek housing project as Phase III began and ongoing communication with all stakeholders continued. The Falcon Parent & Family Association continued to develop and co-sponsored its first event, the Falcon Family Pit Stop, during new student move-in. A number of assessment projects were undertaken to continuously improve services and programs, as well as to measure student learning and development.

Key Highlights

- New Greek housing moved into Phase III with design/build partners chosen and demolition approved/funded by the Board of Trustees in June
- Major events continued to grow in attendance (e.g., Late Night programs, Family Weekend)
- Fraternity & Sorority Life programming budget was reduced by over 70% since FY '11
- First annual Falcon Family Pit Stop during new student move-in was a success
- Increased use of technology (OrgSync) to support student organizations
- The number of fraternity and sorority members grew to 12% of undergraduates
- Assessment continued as a priority (e.g., Fraternity & Sorority Coalition Assessment Project, student organization advisor assessment project, parents/family members' needs assessment)
- Dance Marathon had over 300 dancers, an increase of over 100 students
- Increased the number of actively involved parents in the Falcon Parent & Family Association
- Improved focus on marketing efforts for the office and events

- 273 FTFT students entering BGSU in fall 2012 joined a fraternity/sorority
- Their retention rate to fall 2013 was 84.2% compared to those who did not join whose retention rate was 69%
- Fraternity/sorority joiners in the Fall semester 2012 were $\underline{2.4 \text{ times more likely}}$ to persist to the second year than non-joiners (p < .001)
- Fraternity/sorority joiners in the Spring semester 2013 were $\underline{2.9 \text{ times more likely}}$ to persist to the second year than non-joiners (p < .001)
- Those who went Greek in fall had an average GPA of 2.73 while those who did not had a 2.58
- Those who went Greek in spring had an average GPA of 2.83 while those who did not had a 2.58

Retention Initiatives

- Data on all students has been loaded into OrgSync and monthly snapshots are saved. These data can be used in the future to track student engagement and retention.
- Staff strongly encouraged use of the Learning Commons for fraternity and sorority members; increase of 35% usage Fall 2012 to Fall 2013
 - 25 chapters utilized the LC resulting in 4,918 sessions and participation from 509 students in Fall 2013
 - 27 chapters utilized the LC resulting in 3,942 sessions and participation from 434 students in Spring 2014
- Campus Fest in the fall and the Get Involved Fair in the spring
- UAO Late Night programming
- Family Weekend
