- III. Open Forum BGSU Votes
  - a. BGSU Votes is a nonpartisan student-led initiative. Helps students, faculty, and staff register to vote and stay up to date with upcoming elections and voting information.
    - i. Why do we vote?
      - 1. It matters because our voices matter. Policies being put into place affect you and those around you.
    - ii. How do you register in Ohio?
      - You can register after GA on paper. You have to register by
        October 6<sup>th</sup> for the November elections. Anyone who will be at
        least 18 by the time of the election.
        - a. Residency Requirement: You pick where you register to vote and can pick your residency.
    - iii. The upcoming general election is on November 4<sup>th</sup>. To vote early, you go anytime to your Board of Elections between October 7<sup>th</sup> and November 2<sup>nd</sup>
      - If you do not or cannot go in person, you can request absentee ballot. It starts on October 7<sup>th</sup> and needs to be mailed to the Board of Elections by October 28<sup>th</sup>
    - iv. What do you need to vote?
      - 1. A valid ID in person. If you don't have that with you, you will need to do a provisional ballot and provide ID later. If it's absentee voting, you need your SSN when you request it.

- v. There is a link in the follow-up with all of the information. It gives you all the information you need to vote.
- b. What is civic engagement?
  - i. Beyond elections, it enables you to serve your community and make sure your voice is heard. BGSU Votes provides information to find service opportunities relating to civic engagement. The Marvin Center also has a bunch of these events and opportunities
  - ii. You can serve as a poll worker at your local Board of Elections. They assist voters on election day. Setting up / close poll location, enforce election laws, and manage polling operations.
    - 1. To become one, you attend the poll worker training, which is this.
    - 2. You then express interest and get connected with your local Board of Elections.
    - 3. Then you go through the process of becoming an official poll worker for that Board of Elections, which allows you to work as one
- c. Q: Is working the polls done in shifts?
  - i. A: That is an all-day thing, especially on the day of elections.
    - 1. Paid for it. It's a long day, typically starting at 5:30 am
  - ii. Can also work during early voting with shorter hours.
