IV. Open Forum

a. Claire Semer- Office of Residence Life

I work with the health dept. at BG, and have been working on the clean air board for the past couple months. Since the spring my colleagues and I have been benchmarking, looking at data, researching, and contacting other schools to bring this new policy to our campus. Thank you for listening for the next few intimate minutes. Tobacco is one of the leading preventable causes of death in US. The department of health & human services has made it easier to implement this policy by supporting and promoting tobacco free policies across the board in higher education. People don't start smoking after age 25- they are typically exposed to cigarettes before or around age 18. Currently 811 universities are 100% tobacco free across the country. Our current policy says you must be a certain distance from the buildings or Most universities are moving to this 100% tobacco free as well, even though it's a slow process. Most schools are considering tobacco free rather than smoke free to cover every product. E-cigs are gaining popularity in residence halls and other buildings and cause many problems.

b. Christian- Committee Member

Our current policy is the clean air and smoking policy. Smoking is defined as inhaling, exhaling, or burning any device that's used for ingesting tobacco. Currently smoking is banned on campus except for specific areas. The tobacco free policy is defined as any tobacco product that can be smoked, dipped, or simulated smoking will be prohibited on campus property or any leased area. No designated areas, how to report “hot spots”. The key to the policy is educating students about the policy as well as educating staff and faculty. Violations will be addressed in our new online system, and that's where you can also report hotspots that will inevitably pop up. Enforcement and the success of the policy will really come down to education and the cooperation of everybody. Violations can be addressed by conversations and educating them.

c. Faith Yingling- Director of Wellness Connection

One of the biggest issues we see on campus are the butts littered which creates too much work for campus operations. We want to promote student success and safety because students do better when they're healthy and safe. It is much more beyond cigarette use. Tons of different products on market contain or mimic nicotine, and also many different drugs can be put into vaporizers that are illegal and we can't tell just by looking at them what's actually in there. We need to decrease second-hand smoke for students around campus because these products release a lot of toxins into the air. We have seen many positive results in our research so far. When students were surveyed in 2010 on tobacco use we got a certain percentage, and those numbers have dropped even more over the past 4 years. However, cigarette use has decreased while smokeless tobacco products have gained popularity. We have a higher rate of smokeless tobacco use than ever. Almost every MAC school has some kind of smoke and tobacco free policy. Preventing negative health effects and the success with smoke free policies at other schools make the policy worthy. USG can support by helping to draft a letter to present our research and ideas for the upcoming board of trustees meeting. Please email me with any further questions.

d. Jackie Nelson- Marketing and Communications

We have been speaking with constituents and educating them about the policy that we want to implement. We are getting a lot of opinions and questions in letter form right now. Hopefully by end of December, the policy will be implemented. By Feb 1st, we are talking about starting education about tobacco and how it effects the campus overall because most people have no idea. We have come up with some very creative ways to educate, and will continue through the summer and into fall 2016. We are coming up with marketing strategies- we are working on developing a tagline that's catchy yet informative. Greek members, health science & nursing program students to help us softly enforce. We want to teach students to have a conversation if they see people violating the policy. We will be having events on campus, bringing surveys and speakers, etc. We also want to put signage on every road coming into campus, and plan to put the policy on every screen on campus as well as social media, alum magazine, The Blade, etc., to get word out about policy. It will be made big during campus

fest 2016 to start off the year educating everyone. We are doing all these things so that no student can say, "I didn't know about it."

- g. Johnson- Why are e-cigs being banned from campus? The most recent research shows they produce toxins that are equal to second hand smoke to people around. As I mentioned earlier many different drugs can be put into these e-cigs making it hard to tell what's in there. Library has implemented their own policy because the toxins are destroying books. Residence life has a policy as well because of too many fire alarms and damage to property.
- h. Berry- I heard you mention marijuana several times. Are you creating this policy because it will benefit the university or because it's coming up on the ballot in the fall? It's going to benefit the university. It's hard to tell what's going to happen regarding marijuana. I have been to many conferences regarding marijuana so I am pretty up to date on what's going on with that. As we mentioned e-cigs and vaporizers can be used to smoke marijuana and we don't want that around campus. It is currently illegal from a federal government standpoint. We are under federal funding and therefore do not want to allow students to do that drug on campus. Colorado has legal use of marijuana but still universities do not allow it on campus.
Berry- In the event that it's passed on the ballot will it be allowed on campus? It will only be legal for those over 21, and we will be under government funding, so no. The ballot would only make it legal in Ohio, not at the federal level.
- i. Gucker- How will it be enforced? There's a wide variety of methods in different campuses from no enforcement to tickets. The data shows it to be a problem in education. People aren't comfortable walking up and telling someone to stop so it's hard to address the situation. Hot spots will pop up around where people will start smoking. There will be an online version of reporting. We will take care of most people, but if someone consciously chooses to continue, after the education, they will be referred to head of their college in same discipline of violation of a policy. It's not a criminal offence- it's a violation of policy.

- j. Johnson- Why will people want to listen if there's not a consequence? We feel like research shows that it won't be a big battle. When designated areas were implemented, tobacco use dropped by 80%. Education is the answer.
- k. Why don't we just do smoke free vs all tobacco free campus? Smoke free does not encompass dip. Dip affects everyone because people are spitting and reaching into their mouths and their bodily fluids is everywhere- door handles, bathrooms, etc. because they aren't able to wash hands immediately all the time.
- l. Garcia- This may be personal but do any of you smoke?
 - a. Christian- I understand addiction, I smoked for 25 years and I quit 10 years ago. We need to challenge ourselves to be better and not rely on a vice. I quit to make sure I was around for my kids.
 - b. Claire Semer- I love smoking personally. I smoked for a very long time and I also understand the addiction. I have colleagues who smoke and we all understand the addiction. Smoking is very disrespectful to people around us who are trying to learn and live in this community so we feel the policy is worthy.
- m. Katz- Why would there be a media push outside campus? Not a push, mainly just a press release that states we will become another Ohio university that joined this policy. We don't even know that the release will be picked up.
- n. Dortch- Where *can* people smoke? Anywhere off campus. They cannot be on any campus property. They can get in cars, go across the street, etc. We won't direct people on where to go, it can be up to them. The change will happen over time- we won't be able to get people to just switch cold turkey because no one likes that much change.

a. First off, last week in our meeting the faculty senate that I am the student representative for, welcomed the CIO John Ballenger to talk about Dropbox and other technology updates. We are debating whether to open personal dropboxes for professors or if they should buy one from a corporate sponsor. Cabinet is working this year to start some new liaisonships and initiatives and what they want to accomplish this year, which will be discussed at our meeting tonight. Two weeks ago we discussed the event policy that OCA is putting out- I now have an FAQ list for everyone that will be public on their website.

1. Are all events required to be registered with the OCA? No.
2. How was registration done before? The person in charge would contact the facility manager who would contact OCA; OCA staff would contact the Student Event Coordinator who would conduct an audit, and after that you would need to go to two or three other people. That was too many stops- now you only have to go to one person who will know the answers to your questions.
3. How will that improve student experience? You'll only have one office to contact.
4. Does it always take 45 days to approve an event? No, not always.
